

Resolutions expressive of the sense of Con gress of the gallant conduct of Commodore Edward Preble, the fficers seamen and mariners of his squadron

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of A. merica, in Congress assembled, That the thanks of Congress be and the same are hereby presented to Commodore Edward Preble, and through him, to the officers petty officers, seamen and marines attached to the squadron under his command, for "Sheir gallantry and good conduct displayed in the several attacks on the town, batteries and naval force of Tripoli, in the year one thousand eight hundred and four

Resolved, That the Piesident of the United States be requested to cause a gold medal to be thruck, emblematical of the attacks, on the town, batteries, and naval force of Tripoli, by the iquadron under Con modore Preble's command, and to prefent it to commodore Preble, in such manner, as in his opinion will be most honorable to him. And that the President be further request d to caule a sword to be presented to each of the commissioned officers and m dthipmen who have dittinguith ed themselves in the several attacks.

Resofved, That one month's pay be allowed exclusively of the common allowance to all the petty officers, leamen and marines of the fquadron, who so gloriously supported he honor of the American flag, under the orders of their gallant command. et in the several attacks.

Resolved Tha the President of the U. nited States be also requelled to commu nicate to the parents or other relatives of captain Richard Somers, lieutenant, Hen ry Wadsworth, James Decatur, James !! Caldwell, Joseph Israel, and midshipman John Sword Dorsey, the deep regret which Congress feel for the loss of those gallant men, whose names ought to live in the recollection and affection of a grateful country, and whose conduct ought to be regarded as an example to future generati-
