

Barbados, with the news of the Toulon fleet of 19 sail having arrived at Cadiz; that Sir J. O. had put into Gibraltar. The frigate had 17 days passage.

Some fellow, about as much fool as known, made an attempt to break into the mayor's office last evening about the hour of nine o'clock. He had effected his way through a window, and two of the interior doors leading towards the office, but finding impediments still opposing him, he made a desperate attack upon an outer window, and had actually nearly succeeded in taking out the whole frame, when he was interrupted by a gentleman who lodges in one of the apartments, and was obliged to make a precipitate decampment. If it was justice my honest gentleman was to be eager after, he is desired to call at a more feintionable hour; if money was the object, he will never be so inquisitive as to break in as a poor fellow, as the deserted attics of a country church.

The extensive rope-walk in Southwark belonging to Mellis, Snowden and North, accidentally took fire on Friday afternoon and was entirely destroyed.

We are sorry to state that advices are received in this city of a contagious fever having again appeared and already doing great ravages at Malaga and in other parts of Spain; which the above calamities more fatal than had afflicted Spain in former years—this information we have received from a source the most unquestionable, and think it our duty to publish it, that the proper officers of the several ports of the United States, may be apprized of the fact.

It is in general recollection that during the last year, the post of New York was for several weeks kept in a state of blockade, by the British frigate Carolina, captain B. Auley—and that our government made complaint and had him recalled, and that he was succeeded by Beresford, who was pursued nearly the same course—Beresford who was recalled, it now appears, instead of being cashiered or court-martialed, has been promoted to command of a line of battle ship of 74 guns.

Exactly so was captain Horne promoted, when general Washington complained of his insult to the governor of Rhode Island. It is in vain to expect any change from affection or justice in the British councils towards America.

*Noli me tangere*.—The publication of a biographical work, containing the genealogical and revolutionary history of new princes of the imperial court of Bonaparte, having been lately announced in the Mercantile Advertiser, an aide-de-camp of general Turreau, French minister plenipotentiary in the United States, came post-haste to town for the express purpose of preventing the said publication. The minister foreseeing that this work would occasion many polemical discussions, and of course highly displeasing the new imperial court, thought it advisable to stop the publication by buying the manuscript.

The bargain was accordingly made, and Mr. Daudet, the author of said work, who lodges at Mrs. Broquet and Frelinker's boarding-house, in Greenwich-street, gave up his manuscript to the said aide-de-camp, for the consideration of 1000 dollars, and a free passage to Martinico, where he is bound.

We are informed that the gentleman who was to translate the said work bearing of the transaction offered 1500 dollars for it, but that Mr. Daudet who had passed his word declined the offer.

The public curiosity would no doubt have been highly gratified by the publication of the said work as it would have provoked curious and replies, by which these upstart princes would have appeared in their true light. The article concerning Talleyrand Perigord, particularly would have furnished matter for many critical observations.—*N. Y. Daily Advertiser*.

May 4th.—Dispatches were yesterday received here, brought by his majesty's ship Mercury, captain the honorable D. P. Bouverie, from vice-admiral Sir John Orde, dated "his majesty's ship Glory, at sea, April 10th, 1805," communicating the important intelligence of the sudden appearance off Cadiz, of the Toulon fleet, consisting of from 20 to 24 sail, eleven or twelve of them of the line, and the rest heavy frigates. This fleet, it appears, was on the evening of the 9th, close off Cadiz harbor, where one French ship

of the line, and six or seven Spanish, were then ready to join them, and three or four more would be in about 24 hours. Whether any troops were on board these ships was not known, nor had the destination of this force after its junction had been ascertained, but it was judged to be to the westward; and it was reported that the Spanish ships were bound to the Havanna.

From this intelligence it is very evident that the safety of the West Indies is again threatened, and that we ought not to be lulled into inactivity. The enemy's object, it has been already experienced, is predatory warfare; and that they can effect this with impunity, the escape of Meliffly sufficiently evinces. According to the latest accounts, this enterprising hero, after having landed the remainder of Laugrange's troops at St. Domingo, and carried his system of destruction and pillage into further effect, has failed from thence, and proceeded, as is confidently said, to New-torndland, where we can look for no long time of his late wantonness, well corresponding with his elegant prototype Roclery, who formerly robbed the high-seas there, and burnt their boats.

The Mercury, after the dispatches were delivered, immediately proceeded to sea, and stood to the westward. Sir John Orde, we understand, had also sent advices of the enemy's appearance off Cadiz to England, and of Lord Nelson, up the Mediterranean.

His majesty's ship Cyane, captain the honorable G. Cadezon, arrived on Wednesday, with the prize privateer Spanish schooner La Justicia, of 7 guns and 80 men, from Cumana, on 7th day, and taken in the latitude of Delicada.

### From the Merchants' Coffee-House Books

June 4.  
Arrived, brig Three Brothers, M'Neal, from Guadaloupe, via Antigua, 17 days from latter place—sugar and coffee—John Carriere—Sailed from Point Petre (Guad.) 27th April; 29th, Antigua, bearing E by S, was blown to by a fierce under French colours, which afterwards proved to be the schr. Blanche, (privateer) commanded and owned by capt. Hoiser, Jennings, late of Baltimore, who after examining the ship's papers, and finding a valuable cargo, concluded to send her into Antigua, where they arrived 30th, and after 15 days detention was brought to trial; the plea was, that there was not a certificate, that the duties were paid on the importation of the cargo, exported to the West Indies. Left Antigua 17th May, ship Mary, Knight of Port and from Martinique bound to New York with a valuable cargo, waiting trial; brig Sumarah, Kogly, of Philadelphia, in the voyage to N. Orleans, taken by a French privateer, retaken by the British, waiting trial; the captors suing for salvage, for Favorite, Fletcher, from Norfolk for Barcelona (Spanish Main) taken by the British, and detained at sea 24 days, on account of an error in the Register, representing the schr.'s having no head, which she had, after 4 days detention was acquitted with trial; to fail for her detained port 12h; ship Emily, Burnham, of New York for Norfolk in 4 days. The pilot boat schr. North, Bartlet, from Baltimore arrived at Antigua 15th, and sailed next day for Guadaloupe. May 25, lat 23, 10; long. 69, spoke schr. Flora, Anderson, from St. Thomas to New York, out 5 days.—June 10, Cape Hatteras, bearing W. N. W. distant 12 leagues. Spoke schr. Wm. and Margaret, Potts, from Havana to Newport, B. J. out 11 days.

On the 16th inst the governor of Antigua received dispatches from Barbados, stating that the combined fleets of French and Spaniards consisting of 52 sail, were seen steering westward from the coast of Europe.
