African Church and School.

TO THE CITIZENS OF BALTIMORE AND OTHERS. We the subscribers, Trustees of the Methodist African Church in the city of Baltimore, in behalf of our brethren of color, take the liberty of addressing you on a subject in which the unfortunate African race is deeply concerned. It is known to all, that they have long suffered under the influence of ignorance, and of vice, its inevitable concomitant. The African Methodists of this city, being well interested for the present and rising generations, and desiring that information, through the medium of education and the preaching of the gospel, would reach to the poor, oppressed, and degraded African race, a few years past purchased the African school house for a place of worship and a school for the people of color. The purchase money, though large in amount, was fully discharged and paid. They have accordingly purchased a piece of ground for the burial of the dead.

The Lord has prospered their endeavors to procure the information and happiness of their brethren; but the house is now too small to contain the congregation which attends. Desirous of being more or enviously useful, and stimulated by the encouraging assurances of support from their white friends and others, they are anxious to enlarge the church; but from the late great advances they have made in the payment for the church, and the debt contracted for the burial ground, they feel unable to effect the object of their wishes alone, and therefore solicit the assistance of all who are interested in the information, civilization and welfare of the present and succeeding generations of the African race—Confidently hoping their well meant endeavors will cordially meet the warmest approbation and generous assistance of their fellow citizens. The committee appointed for that purpose will wait on them for the testimony of their approbation. Mr. John Hagerty has kindly accepted of the trusteeship; and Messrs. Emanuel Kerr, James McCannan, and Isaac Burnston, have consented to assist with their advice and attention in making the proposed alterations. Under their direction the public may rely all monies received will be carefully appropriated for the uses intended.—Trusting in the direction and superintendence of a kind over ruling Providence, it is hoped your donations will be seen in the improvement and happiness of the present and future generations.
