Although from official reports respecting the contagious disease which raged last Autumn in Malaga, occasioning fo much devaltation, the Royal College has likewife been informed that the faid contagion had ceased in the month of December next following, to as to leave no apprehention of its spreading any further, and that coalequently all measures of precaution li therto entorced, had been discontinued in Spain, fince the month of March last; yet, as this Epidem c, which in all probability was a species of Yellow Fever, has already, within a few years, repeatedly renewed its fymptoms in the faid kingdom; and whereas, on account of its mercantile relations with America, it is ever to be seared that the contagion may again be communicated, especially because the measures of guarding against it may be less generally known, or not thricily entorced; Now therefore, the Royal College thinks fit hereby to apprize you of the necessity of taking particular notice, that upon every occasion of Swedilli velleis bou a to orti. obtained respecting the state of heaith and foundness of the crew, and whenever there is any ground for apprehending contagion. then to certify the same on the pais, and immediately to report the same to the Royal College, &c. &c.


