The John Morgan, has arrived at New York, in 32 days passage from London, dates to the 2d of May. The most important intelligence is that the French and Spanish fleets remain in Cadiz, before which Lord Nelson had appeared with a considerable force. The grand expedition from England had gone up the Mediterranean. Nothing important independent of the above.

**FRENCH FLEET.**—The captain of the schooner Federalist, arrived yesterday from St. Bartholomew's, has politely furnished the editor with the following important information:—That the Toulon Squadron, consisting of nine sail of the line, 6 frigates, and two brigs, had arrived at Fort Royal, Martinique—they had captured on their passage the sloop of war Cayenne. The English merchant vessels loading at Montserrat had orders to provide for their own safety in consequence of the arrival of the French fleet.

Alexandria pap.

The following extract of a letter received by a Gentleman of this City from his Correspondent at St. Johns, Porto Rico serves to corroborate the information heretofore received via Alexandria, and published in the REGISTER of the 5th instant, of a Squadron of men of war having failed from Cadiz bound to the West Indies.

It is, however, to be observed that the first intelligence stated the fleet to consist of 19 sail of the line and 12 frigates. The source of both accounts appears to us to be the same, a Spanish government brig arrived at Porto Rico.

"St. Johns, Porto Rico, 22d May 1865. A Spanish armed brig arrived here the 19th, in 30 days from Cadiz: She failed in company with a Spanish and French fleet, of 12 sail of the line and 6 frigates, destined for the West Indies. She left the fleet ten days previous to her arrival here, all well."

By Captain Deagle's Norfolk Packet, we have received Norfolk papers to the 8th inst. from which the following articles have been selected:

**NORFOLK, JUNE 6.** Arrived, schooner Diedamia, Howes, 6 days from Charleston. On Friday last, in lat. 32, 40, long. 78, 30, schooner Favourite, David Snow, 54 days from Baltimore, bound to Charleston—his mate had died at sea—supplied him with provisions and water.—Same day, lat. 33, long. 77, was spoken by a French privateer of 14 guns and full of men, who after abusing Captain H left him to give chase to a large schooner to leeward, which he soon brought to; they were still in company when the darkness prevented Captain H. from any longer observing them. Ship Reward, Moulton, 12 days from Newburyport.

**June 8.** Captain Cook who arrived in the Paragon, contradicts the various accounts lately published, of the ports in Jamaica being opened for American vessels.—He adds, that the Governor was authorized to open the ports to Americans whenever he thought proper, but, notwithstanding the many remonstrances from the inhabitants, he declined doing so, as he considered there was a sufficiency of provisions in the island for 12 months.—In consequence of this harsh conduct, there was a meeting of the different parishes, when it was resolved that the inhabitants should wear a sash for one month, on account of his precluding the American trade. A gentleman who came passenger in the ship Emily, from Antigua, informs, that off the Spanish Main the schooner Favorite, captain Fletcher, belonging to this port, was taken possession of by a British cruiser on account of her register being incorrect, not having designated her figure-head; and after a detention of thirty days was liberated; but not before she was captured; however, they had the politeness of sending the head home in the ship!

The Printers throughout the U. S. are requested to publish, for the information of Merchants and others concerned, the following extracts and translations of official letters received from the Royal College of Commerce at Stockholm, by RICHARD SODERSTROM, His Swed. Maj. Com. Agent near the U. S.

No. I. Letter, to commercial agents residing in the United States of North America.

Although from official reports respecting the contagious disease which raged last Autumn in Malaga, occasioning so much devastation, the Royal College has likewise been informed that the said contagion had ceased in the month of December next following, so as to leave no apprehension of its spreading any further, and that consequently all measures of precaution thereto enforced, had been discontinued in Spain, since the month of March last; yet, as this Epidemic, which in all probability was a species of Yellow Fever, has already, within a few years, repeatedly renewed its symptoms in the said kingdom; and whereas, on account of its mercantile relations with America, it is ever to be feared that the contagion may again be communicated, especially because the measures of guarding against it may be less generally known, or not strictly enforced; Now therefore, the Royal College thinks fit hereby to apprise you of the necessity of taking particular notice, that upon every occasion of Swedish vessels being at or near your district, or foreign vessels being bound for Sweden, a correct knowledge may be obtained respecting the state of health and soundness of the crew, and whenever there is any ground for apprehending contagion, then to certify the same on the part, and immediately to report the same to the Royal College, &c. &c.

Stockholm, July 16th, 1864.

No. II. His Majesty for the purpose of securing the kingdom against the raging Epidemic, which has again broke out in Malaga, has, by royal letter of the 16th instant, been pleased graciously to ordain, that all vessels from the said city or other suspected places, arriving into any port of the kingdom situated out of the Sound or Baltic sea, shall be ordered for the Island of Kert, situated one Swedish mile from the fortress of Ellsborg, for the purpose of undergoing quarantine, a provincial establishment of this kind being immediately to take place there by His Majesty's command; And moreover His Majesty desirous of enforcing such regulations as have been adopted in Denmark, has been pleased to ordain that no vessel, coming from Malaga (or other suspected places) and bound for any Swedish port or place in the Baltic, shall be allowed to pass the Sound, unless it can prove, by a bill of health in due form granted by the commissioners or Board of Health established at Christianland in Norway, that it has undergone the quarantine in said place, or been found by the said commissioners to be free of all suspected contagious disease; or otherwise such vessel or vessels will be ordered back again to Christianland. The Royal College hereby appripes you of this royal order, enjoining you to communicate the same not only to all masters of Swedish vessels which may arrive within your district, but also to all foreign vessels arriving from Malaga, or other suspected places which may be bound for this kingdom. Given at Stockholm, October 23d, 1864.

No. III. Since erecting and establishing a quarantine ground on the island of Kert, on the coast of Gettenburg, His Majesty has graciously been pleased to command by letter of the 27th of November, last past, addressed to the Royal College of Trade and Commerce, that during the continuance of such quarantine, the said port shall be shut against all vessels arriving from places free from contagion; of which the commercial agents are hereby enjoined to communicate information in foreign newspapers; at the same time, His Majesty has judged it to be necessary, that all masters of vessels from Sweden and its dependencies, who may be in foreign ports, shall receive order thro' the commercial agents abroad, to provide themselves with a black flag, and hoist the same on approaching the Swedish coast, whenever they may be coming from infected or suspected places: this flag being intended as a warning to pilots and others concerned, &c. &c. Stockholm, 10th December, 1864.

No. IV. Whereas His Majesty has graciously ordained, under date the 21st inst. that it shall hence forward be the duty of all Swedish commercial agents and commissaries residing abroad, whenever a contagious disease breaks out in or near their places of residence, immediately to report the same, not only to the Royal College of Trade and Commerce, but also direct to the Quarantine Commissioners, (or Board of Health) at Gottenburg, and moreover, to transmit a list of such vessels as may then be in port and be loading for Sweden and ports in the Baltic: Now, therefore, the Royal College does hereby make known to you His Majesty's gracious command for your faithful observance, &c. &c. Stockholm, December 27th, 1864.

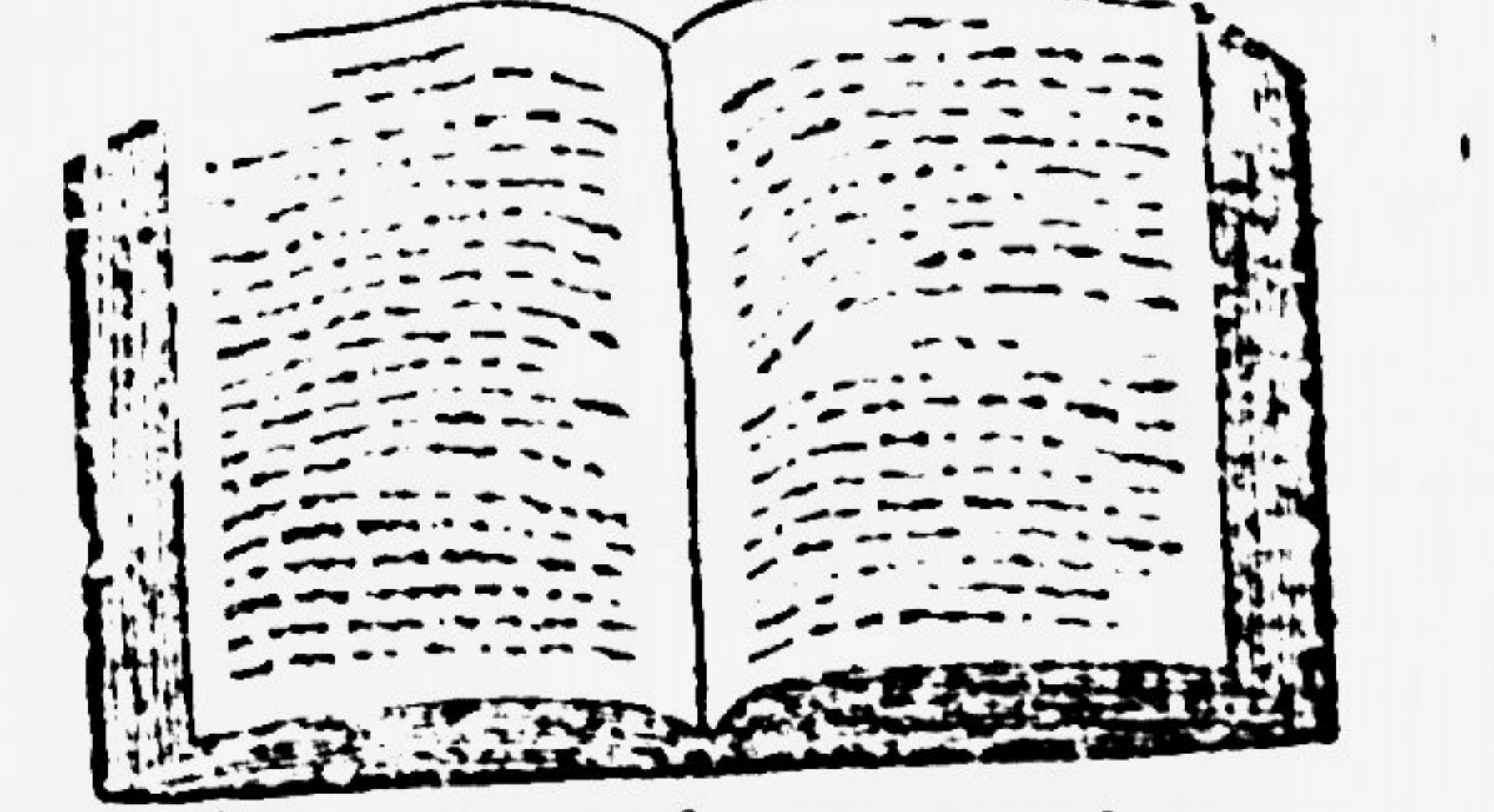
