

sailed, with intelligence that a French and Spanish fleet, consisting of about 17
part of the line, had arrived to windward
of the island; that a reinforcement of 19 days
from England had been sent, and important dis-
patches to Barbados; and that Lord
Nelson with the whole of his fleet was on
his way to the West Indies.

That these were at present lurking among the coast of the Savannah Advertiser of the 22d May, set the purpose of plan-
ning a band of vigilance whose designs to
act for the safety of our countrymen from
several recent attempts of this kind. The
almost uniform or unanimous meetings
in the circumference of our buildings,
notions here and there of particular dread,

it therefore becomes our citizen to be
vigilant in endeavoring to turn down
the demands of dealers to us, and to
prevent their nefarious purposes. The
City Council have set a laudable example,
by authorizing the mayor to offer a re-
ward of one hundred dollars for the discov-
ery of the person or persons who made
two attempts on the evenings of the 2d and
2d last, to set fire to a wooden
building in the city, and offered an additional
reward of fifty dollars for the discov-
ery of any one who may in future endeavor
to cheat or impede the public pumps
by throwing stones, wood, &c.

LORD MELVILLE—At a special court
of the Common Council, held April 20th,
it was moved to address his majesty upon
the misdeactions of the Viscount Melville.
Some very spirited resolutions were
moved and carried, with the objec-
tions of only four members—two aden-
and two common concurrence.

In the borough a meeting of electors
was also held, the same day, on the same
subject, when various resolutions were
unanimously agreed to censuring the
abuses and delinquencies brought to light
by the committee of enquiry, and calling upon the heads of commons
to detect and punish the guilty.

The select committee appointed to pur-
sue the investigation of the same subject,
on which the resolutions were adopted, Lord
Melville were roundly, and some of his
members who voted against him were
voted for him, and three who did not vote
at all. The list of names in view
of the opposition contained the names
of fifteen or sixteen who voted a absti-
nent Melville. The former, which was
to be the main object, was successful.

It is accounted that Melville mention, that
General Abreton, was still at Cadiz waiting
for the arrival of his son from Paris;
but no orders had been received for his
immediate departure from Spain. It was
expected he would sail for America in
the first vessel he could procure.

various houses in London, written in the
city, dated*

I remain, As I am living,
On the reference to what you told me
the honor to write you the 20th inst, on which
the following is a copy, we now tell the
lucky reader's you that we have since
concluded to receive some good supplies
of grain and flour mostly from the French
ports, informed that our price's have been
very greatly depressed, and daily dec-
reasing; and as much wheat is expected to
drop in from the northern ports, and Indian
corn from the Adriatic sea, independent
of what may arrive from the American
continent, we are of opinion that prices
will not be supported higher, throughout

the whole of the summer, than we have
advised you in our almanac last respect-
ing the earling harvest is likely to be
plentiful, as the season is at present very

propitious for the grain crops tho' much
will depend upon the weather of the com-
ing month. Our fish-stores are doing
pretty well, and we expect to be able

to support pretty tolerable terms for the
first arrivals of the summer fish, say about
5,000 to 5,500 per quintal, should not
much drop in general; all the your
government.

We have a good supply of staves and
barrels just now, and price's are nominal.
There has been and will be a great want

of ship bread, as the bakers cannot supply
the demand, and the price of this article
is considerably higher than the propor-
tional price of wheat and flour, and biscuit
or biscuit is selling at \$2.00 per Portu-

guese quintal, equal to £4.00 sterling at our
present exchange; and w^{ch}ever the de-
mand is great for this article, the price is

much beyond the proportion of flour.
Good beef is selling at 10.800 to 11.000
per barrel; pork, 18.000 per quintal. There
is no alteration in the price of wines, but

the vineyards have a very promising ap-
pearance. Salt is very scarce, and the
price keeps at 6,400 per m^t.

The present current price of wheat, &c.
in market—good hard wheat, 1,000 per
cwt.—American soft do. 900—French do.
840—Indian corn, of the country growing,
640—do. from the United States, 240.

June 15.

Arrived, brig Active, Eishop, 18 days
from St. Bartholomew—ballast—the mis-
ter. Left there, 25th May, schr. Sally,
for Norfolk, in 10 days; schr. Jolly Ro-
bin, for Turks Island, in 5 days; schr.
Washington, for Philadelphia; Victory,
do. Neptune, do. A brig belonging to
P. L. Brown, arrived there the 18th, from Mar-
tinique, the captain of which reported,
he fell in with the Toulon fleet, of 19 sail
of the line, 7 frigates, and some brigs, in
the night, off Gibraltar; and was in co-
siderable danger, steering S. W. but was finally out-
fitted by them.

Capt. Bishop adds, that the day he ar-
rived at St. Bartholomew, accounts were
received from Martinique of the arrival of
the French there—that an embargo had
been laid on all vessels at Martinique and
Guadalupe—that admiral La Foche had
sent orders to the different islands directing
all masters of English vessels to consult
their own safety, as he could afford them
no protection against so large a naval force
as had arrived. The 20th May was the
day appointed for the sailing of the Wind-
ward Island fleet, to rendezvous with those
from Surinam and Demerara at Tortola. It
was expected at St. Bartholomew that a division
of the French fleet would be sent to St. Kitts and Tortola, to take
possession of the English vessels there.
