We have seen a letter from Plymouth,  
Mass., dated the 14th inst. (Thursday  
last) which mentions the arrival there on  
Saturday last, of a vessel from Cadiz, Spain,  
the Commodore, which had been in Cadiz  
more than 21 months, and being immedi-  
ately joined by the Spanish fleet, they put  
to sea and sailed for the northward, sup-  
posed to be destined for Texas. The  
Commodore, it is said, had on board  
2000 troops, and a considerable military ar-  
mament.

From the New York Daily Advertiser,  
Saturday last:

A gentleman who arrived at New York  
on Friday last from Bordeaux, and who  
left Paris about the 23d of April, informs  
us, that it was well known in that city,  
though not officially published, that the  
Toulon and Cadiz squadrons were destined  
for the West Indies, and that their prin-  
cipal object was the reduction of Jamaica.  
The Toulon fleet consisted of 200 troops on  
board, and expected to arrive in New York  
on the 2d of May. The Cadiz fleet, on the  
other hand, was a considerable military force,  
and this however, they were rather disap-  
pointed as they were joined only by five ships  
of the line. The British fleet with 12,000  
troops on board, it was understood, in-  
tended to join the former, and this very for-  
midable armament, was to proceed to-  
gether against the British West India Islands.  
It will be remembered that the British fleet  
did not succeed in putting to sea.—Our  
informant farther states that as there were  
always English frigates and cutters off  
Toulon observing the motions of the  
French squadron, intelligence of its sailing  
must have very soon reached Lord Nelson,  
who, it was said, was off Biscaya on the  
9th of April in pursuit of it. His squad-  
ron, however, must have stopped at Gran-  
tar to water; till it was thought probable  
that he would be only a few days behind  
the enemy, and that by this time he  
may have reached Jamaica. All things  
considered, intelligence of the most serious  
nature may be daily expected from that  
quarter. The French fleet we are certain  
has arrived, and it is possible the English  
has; at any rate it is probable it will soon  
arrive; however this may be the colonies  
of Britain are in the most perilous situa-  
tion.

**NEW-HAMPSHIRE.**—The Legislature  
of this Sister State convened at Concord  
on Wednesday, of last week; upon the  
canvass of the votes, it appears that his  
Excellency JOHN LANGDON, Esq. was  
elected by a majority of near four thousand.  
The Republican majority in the  
House of Representatives is estimated at  
forty five; and the Hon. Samuel Bell,  
Esquire, is Speaker. The Senate made  
choice of Clement Storer, Esq. for Presi-  
dent, which stands 8 to 4, and the Council  
4 to 1. The Hon. Nathaniel Gilman,  
Esq. was re-elected Treasurer, and Philip  
Carrigan, Esq. of Concord, Secretary.

Gov. LANGDON, addressed the Legis-  
lature in a speech, fraught with modesty,  
wisdom, moderation and genuine love for  
the civil and religious freedom of the Uni-  
on. His timely observation, that "the  
Constitution of the United States, guaran-  
tees to each State a Republican form of  
government" is not more true, then con-  
soling to every citizen, who has duly re-  
garded the manifold attempts which have  
been made by the enemies of our Repub-  
lican and happy institutions, under the  
Protean shapes of modern Federalism.—  
When we consider the virtuous regenera-  
tion of the exemplary citizens of New-  
Hampshire, from the delusions of a Royal  
Faction, to the embraces of liberty and  
equal rights, we derive a felicity in the  
present, and a well grounded reliance on  
the future state of policy; from which  
neither hypocrisy, nor corruption, nor  
anglo-federal menaces, shall ever make us  
depart again.—*Laus Deo.*

## HORRIBLE DISAPPOINTMENT!

One day last week, an elderly man in  
Brookfield, Mass. passed we do not know  
to what town, was found hanging in his  
bed by a hall, apparently dead, and his face  
black as a coal. He was immediately cut  
down, but it was nearly half an hour be-  
fore any signs of life were discovered in  
him, and it is said three hours elapsed be-  
fore he could stand or speak. He told his  
wife in the morning that she might get us  
good breakfast, and eat as much as she  
pleased, for it would be the last she would  
ever eat; meaning, it is thought from  
circumstances, to murder her, that he  
might have the satisfaction of being hung  
in consequence, having frequently de-  
clared, previously, that he was sick of living,  
and meant to kill himself some way or  
other. It appears on inquiry, that he ex-  
pected to be taken some time that day,  
for scaling horse shoes; but probably de-  
termined to elude the officer by hanging  
himself. He was taken, however, and was  
able to accompany the officer to this town,  
where he was tried, convicted and fined.  
We hear he made an attempt to cut his  
own throat on that day; and on his way  
to this place, while in the custody of the  
officer, actually attempted to drown him-  
self by plunging from a bridge into the  
East Branch of White River, and would  
doubtless have effected it, but for the hu-  
manity of the officer, who waded into the  
river up to his neck after him, and rescued  
him from immediate destruction.—  
After paying the fine and costs of prose-  
cution, he went to the north part of this  
town, where he tarried that night; the  
next day he returned to Brookfield, and  
about some time, and stoned every one  
who came near him. At last the authori-  
ty of Brookfield prevailed upon him, with  
a good deal of difficulty, to go home to  
his family. He is a man of handsome  
property, and has a large family of child-  
ren, whose hearts he must have broken  
by his singular conduct.
