Messrs. PECHIN & FRATLEY.

IN your paper of Wednesday morning I was much entertained by the ingenious observations of a Stockholder. In his remarks on the Union Bank, he says— "It is generally supposed that the gentlemen at the head are allowed \$5000 a week, and that the sum total in their hands is the enormous aggregate of \$311,000." The directors of the different banks are not only allowed \$5000 a week accommodations, but some of them are in the constant habit of getting from four to six thousand dollars a week extra. The Mr. Dickson, a director of one of the banks, gets no money, and some others do not get the round sum of \$5000, but get the following estimations of the sums held by the directors cannot be over-rated:—

If the above is any thing near the amount, and it is presumed to be considerably under the real sum—one third of all the bank capital in the state is in the hands of the bank directors—but do these 61 individuals own one third of the wealth of the state or city?—Do they own one fifth-part of the property?—I shall not be contradicted in saying they do not own one fourth part of the property of the city of Baltimore; yet they possess and exercise an arbitrary control over all the money in the city—Do their powers for conducting these institutions, justify entitle them to such enormous patronage?—Is it just—is it right—is it politic, in any point of view, either for the good of individuals, stockholders, for the country or the interests of the city, that it should be the case?—By what rule of proportion can it be reconciled?—Does the property of the city require that all the money should be in the hands of a few individuals?—Or to have a general circulation throughout the community?—Does their wealth entitle them to it in preference to any one else?—Or, if they are all men of real, solid, permanent, unshaken wealth, why do they want to borrow so much money?—They are wealthy, it is true, and so would any person be with 50 or 100 thousand dollars in his purse—but supposing them stripped of their bank loans—where would be their wealth then?—Bank directors are as liable to misfortune as other men—and it must be in the recollection of the citizens of Baltimore, that a bank director has been known to stop payment and fail for the round sum of sixteen hundred thousand dollars.—It is not the wish or intention of the writer of this to make any observations with a view to influence the approaching election.—On the plan that the banks in this city are conducted it is of no consequence who directs them.—It is known and acknowledged by the 49 50th of the citizens that the banks are improperly managed and no hopes are entertained of any redress unless it is through the interposition of the legislature or the indignant powers of an insulted community.—To reform or convince men of error, unless one has the power of removing them is impossible—to talk to men about the abuse of an office which they are fixed in for life will be of no use—it would be like converting an Atheist by quoting Scripture. In a recent conversation which the writer had with one of the directors of the Bank of Pennsylvania, he was informed that one thousand dollars a week was all that the directors of that institution took as an accommodation and though that board consists of the most wealthy and reputable merchants on the continent, that not one accommodation account is as high as \$15,000—that on particular occasions some individuals had gone as high as 20 or \$30,000—it was only on conditions that the paper should be lifted when it came to maturity, and that the directors of that bank, when they found specie getting scarce and were under the necessity of reducing

the discounts, first began with themselves—this was generous and worthy of imitation. A good general or commander when besieged and put on short allowance will share the dangers of a siege with his inferiors, but a Baltimore bank director with his rapacious appetite would let the garrison starve for fear there would not be enough for himself.—Some of the directors of the Union Bank were much opposed to the rotation principle being incorporated into the Union Bank—they had a dislike to the ineligibility of a director after serving a certain time and gave as a reason to the legislature that men could not be found capable of managing the institution—but it is to be hoped that Baltimore is not like Sodom of old, that five righteous persons cannot be found in it—I hope there are more than five—there may be ten found out next Monday—should it be the case and two or three of these great men should fall, or rise like Elijah, it is to be hoped they will suffer some of the young ones to seize their mantle before they take their flight.

HAVING just arrived from the country, and finding a great bustle made about choosing directors for the Union Bank, it led me to make some enquiry into the cause of the present solicitude for the directorship. I am informed that each director is entitled to \$5000 a week, which appears to be a most half the present capital to be held among nineteen men. Now I always understood, from the publications about the time this institution went into effect, that the object was public utility. However, this is a matter that does not much concern me, all I want is to have the real earnings of my hands secured; I find that it is not the public good, but their own individual interest that those said gentlemen generally have in view.

I will propose a plan, as I think for the good of the institution, at any rate for us country folks—that is, that every candidate previous to his being elected shall produce himself to take up all his accommodation paper at the end of every year or not be eligible. This I think will secure to us men of real capital and consequently prevent us from being imposed upon by men, whose sole object is the acquisition of the cash.

BY inserting the following in your paper it may urge to their duty those whose department it is to bring to justice an unprincipled offender of the law.

CIVIS.

Some little time back a vessel from a foreign port arrived here—and there happening some disputes between the captain of said vessel and his hands, who were all shipped for the voyage, and they evincing a disposition of running away from the vessel, he confined them in jail and employed persons to unlash the vessel and render her, and when ready for sea to take his hands from confinement & proceed to complete his voyage—a measure often pursued by captains of vessels as the only way of redress from refractory seamen and which is sanctioned by the usage of all nations. While these men were in confinement they were visited by a certain man alive to the tender feelings of sensibility, who, out of pure compassion alone, enquired at our goal of the prisoners, all the circumstances of their confinement. Only one of these seamen could speak English, the rest were all Germans.—He informed our tender hearted philanthropist the nature of their confinement, also the obligations they would all be under could they be liberated from it and not be sent back to their own country.—A thought struck the infamous follower of the humane Howard—he told the man to enquire whether they would consent to acknowledge themselves indebted to him in a small sum each, which, if they agreed to, he would bring a magistrate to them and on their acknowledgment he would in a day or two have them released and they should become citizens. They consented—he immediately went to a magistrate and took out warrants for the seven seamen for a trifle under 100 each and got the magistrate to go with him up to the jail, where they all confessed judgment for the debt.

The captain having by this time got his vessel ready for sea, went to the jail to liberate his hands, expecting he had to pay only the jail fees; when he was informed by the jailer that there were detainers against them to near the amount of 200 dollars. In vain the captain remonstrated—in vain he applied to his merchant—in vain he applied to the laws for redress.—For alas! no summary justice could be obtained and he was obliged to pay the money before he could liberate his hands to proceed on his voyage; and on his arrival at the port where he shipped

them, charged them with the amount of the debts paid for them while in confinement.

The Governor of Barbadoes, has by proclamation of April 2, confirmed the permission granted in his proclamation of October 23, to import all the articles therein enumerated (horses excepted) into that island in neutral vessels, and from the U. States, until the 23d of October next. Among these articles are flour, provisions, and grain of all kinds.
