

very sick with the dysentery, and the more physic she took, the worse she seemed to get; and he likewise added that he had buried a little daughter of the same age, and with the same complaint some years past. I prescribed a tea-cup full of the strong decoction of the root of the low blackberry, the effect was similar to that taken by myself—she recovered in a short time, to the great joy of her worthy parents.

I resided, afterwards, in New England, and took a fancy to a charming little boy of one of my indigent neighbors, who indulged me with the company of the child frequently at my house, for days and weeks together, and having at one period nursed him for a week, it led me particularly to enquire for him, when I was informed that he was buried that morning with one of his sisters, and that the third and only surviving child lay almost expiring with the same complaint, the dysentery—I flew to the house of sorrow, and of death, in order to save one child, if possible, when to my surprise I found my favorite boy still living, altho' very sick—his two little sisters had been buried that morning. I demanded of the mother who their physician was, and whether he pursued the same course of medicine with this child as with the two others who had died? She answered that he did to her certain knowledge. Does your child grow worse or better? It grows worse and worse, the same as the other children did, replied the mother.—Why then, in the name of common sense, does he not try some other means?—I then demanded the situation of the two children previous to their death, and was told that they swelled very much, even to have the appearance of almost bursting—I then observed my little favorite more attentively, when I discovered his hands and feet were very much swelled—Shew me the medicine, said I, almost frantic with grief and fear.—When, behold, it was called! I concealed my feelings from the mother, but privately threw the callomel into the fire, for fear she should administer it during the time that I was gone in search of the physician—I could not find him; and as there was no time to be lost, I took the liberty to wrest the dear little boy from the jaws of death, without his leave, by giving him the strong tea made of the root of the running blackberry, and afterwards, a dose of gentle physic, to carry off the effects of the callomel from the system, for which God the great has never forgiven me.

At a late time, I was journeying via the Erie through a small village in New England. I called at a house where there was a young lad in bed very sick with the dysentery—I directed the mother to prepare the tea as above and give him two cups full, which was done; and so pleasing and unexpected was the cure, that the lad was sent by his mother to return me thanks at my own house, in less than two weeks, although at the distance of six miles.

**Russian Discipline.**—No army in Europe equals the Russian, in the resemblance it bears to a machine moved by the word of command. An amusing instance of this is given in a French work which was published some time ago. It occurred when the Empress Elizabeth was carrying on war against the King of Prussia. The army being then on the frontiers of Germany, a small picket was placed at some distance from the camp, with the view of watching the motions of the Prussian troops. The soldiers employed in this service were supplied with provisions for 23 hours. The enemy however came on unexpectedly from a different quarter, and a battle ensued, which entirely drove from the mind of the commander all thoughts of his picket. Some days after, however, he collected the circumstance, and caused enquiries to be made through the army, if any one had seen or heard of it. The answers were all in the negative, upon which a messenger was dispatched to the place where they had been stationed. There accordingly they were found, fixed to the spot, and reduced to the last extremity of hunger, but never thinking of moving. On being asked why, when their provisions failed, they had not returned to the camp?—They were astonished at the question. They had no orders.

**From the present state of Denmark by Catterau, 16 2.**

The Tribunal of Conciliation, established since 1793, is composed of the most intelligent and respectable men in the vintage; and its sessions are private. It is competent to determine upon a great number of civil questions, and both parties agree to the arrangement proposed by the court, its decree is registered, and has legal authority. If the parties cannot be brought to agreement by the tribunal, the interference of the mediators, they are at full liberty to prosecute the cause in a court of justice. All the proceedings of the Tribunal of Conciliation are upon the unstamped paper, and they cannot be protracted longer than 15 days in the country, and eight days in the towns, unless both parties consent to a longer delay. The expenses, which do not exceed three shillings, are not payable, but in case of reconciliation. During the three years preceding that inauguration, there came before the court of law, 25,021 causes; and for the three years following, 2,633, including the extraordinary judgment of 1,500, which is the usual number of causes. The idea of this court was taken from the Dutch, among whom it likewise produced the most happy effects. And when we consider what an important point it is, that there should be time for disputants to cool; the strong probability there is, that four or five impartial men from the vicinage will take a right view of the case, and the assurance that any man must feel to embark his reputation and property in opposition to their opinion, we cannot entertain a doubt of the beauty and importance of the institution. It is hardly possible, that should be had justice which satisfies both parties; and this species of mediation has no validity, but upon such condition. It is curious, too, to remark, how much the progress of nature obstructs the natural course of justice; it appears that plaintiff and defendant were both satisfied in 13,866 causes. If these cases had come on to a regular hearing, and the parties been followed, by the expense and publicity of the quarrel, we doubt if there would have been one single man out of the whole number who would have acknowledged that his cause was justly given against him.
