Capt. Balch, of the barque Mary, arrived at Savannah from Jamaica, has furnished the following account:
 "Monday, 21st May, 1805, at 5 P. M. sailed from Morant Bay; saw a sail at 8 A. M. which appeared to be a felucca in chase of us. On the 23d at 3 P. M. she fired a shot over us, and hoisted French colours. We accordingly hoisted too, and the captain went on board with all necessary papers. The boat's crew were detailed on board the privateer, and the boat manned with privateersmen and sent on board the barque for plunder. In the mean time the remainder of our crew were ordered on board the privateer, and threatened with flogging from the captain down to the boy. One of the hands was brought to the gun, with a rope round his neck, for the purpose of extorting from him an avowal of money or papers which might be concealed. When on the point, however, of putting their purpose in execution, the plunderers on board, hailed the privateer, and said they had found the money. The man was then released. The captain was also threatened, and they were on the point of lashing his hands, when the boat came along side with the money, which drew their attention from him to a more pleasing object. The boat was then manned with a fresh set of robbers, and kept constantly plying between the barque and privateer, until 7 P. M. during which time they robbed us of 1300 dollars in specie, belonging to the barque, besides 450 of the captain's and 500 of the passengers and ship's company; likewise of wearing apparel, liquors, provisions, compasses, quadrants, charts and books, and in short, almost every thing they could lay their hands on; and what they could not take away they destroyed; not leaving such letters and papers as were of no use to them. They struck the masts with their swords whenever he went into the cabin.
 "In this deplorable situation they left us, leaving scarcely enough for our subsistence.
 "We could gain no information from them, where they belonged, or who they were; but have reason to believe they were from Henegau. The vessel was luteen rigged, pink stern, painted yellow, with a white bottom, carrying one six pounder, two swivels, and about 40 men, of all nations and colours."

From the Merchants' Office—Baltimore, June 30.

Arrived, schooner Hope, Wilson, 12 days from Havana—sugar and coffee—John Young and others. Left there 14th inst. besides those reported by captain Newton, brig Midas. The day before sailing, 5 brigs, 1 ship and 3 schooners arrived there; the wind being ahead they had not passed the Meroc—therefore could not learn their names. On the 17th, off Marty's Reef, spoke the brig Newton, of Philadelphia, from New Orleans, to Liverpool.

Also, schooner Catharine, Haylander, 13 days from Martinique—sugar, coffee and cotton—Gabriel Wood. Sailed the 11th inst. in company with schooners Union, of and for Salem; Lucy, of Portsmouth, for Boston; and Plymouth, for Wilmington, N. C.—Left a brig at St. Ann's, belonging to Ferrismouth.

Captain Haylander informs, that the whole of the combined fleets sailed from Martinique on the 6th, excepting two 84 gun ships and a frigate just arrived from France. On the 13th captain H. passed Antigua, and saw a large fleet in the dusk of the evening, off the harbor of St. Johns, standing off and on, apparently making observations, which he believes was the French fleet, as the number corresponded, & all appeared to be large ships.

The probability was, they only had arrived there that day, after taking in at Guadalupe such things as they stood in need of.—The general opinion at Martinique was, the taking of Antigua would be the first object;—previous to their leaving Martinique, three 74 gun ships and a frigate were sent against the Diamond Head, garrisoned by 17 English men who made little resistance and capitulated. After the 4th day's siege, the garrison were sent to Barbades in a cartel.—The French frigate which arrived last from France brought dispatches in 27 days from L'Orient, but nothing of their contents had transpired.—It was the report of the day, that the two French commanders of the army and navy did not perfectly agree.—It was also reported by people of information, that Bonaparte, to deceive Lord Nelson, had a number of letters written by the relations of the officers of the Toulon fleet, wishing them success in their intended expedition to Egypt, which letters had been put on board of fast-sailing luggers, which were to throw themselves in the way of Nelson's cruisers, in order to lead them astray, and which was supposed to have had the desired effect, as no account had reached Martinique on the 11th, of any English fleet arriving in those seas.—It was said the French fleet were in want of many things; the arsenals there were totally unprovided—their main object was to get provisions of some of the English arrivals, to which they might have recourse, in case of any accidents happening their vessels. The number of troops on board their fleet was 10,000. Heard nothing of the sickly state of the Spanish ships, as heretofore reported.
