Extract of a letter from St. Thomas, dated June 10th, received by Mary, Mont-leath, arrived at Philadelphia.

"From present appearances there must be a considerable change of property in these Islands. The French have 30 sail of the line and 10 frigates at Martinique. The British (it is said and believed,) have 21 sail of the line at Barbadoes. The French Admiral has demanded the surrender of all the English Islands, in due form; if the British fleet has arrived, the answer will no doubt be a noisy one."

Jamaica, which is threatened by the French, was taken by the British from the Spaniards in 1656. Its annual exports are conjectured to amount to 12 or 15 millions of dollars. It is about 150 miles long, and 40 broad—and probably now contains 30,000 free inhabitants and near 200,000 slaves. If the blacks are attached to their masters, and will act heartily against the invaders, the French will be defeated at once; and if they cannot be trusted with arms by the British in defending the island, and it should be conquered, the French would experience with them in a short time, a repetition of the St. Domingo Tragedy.

Extract of a letter from London, dated May 10.

"I heard it this morning, of one of the public officers, that government, having strong reasons to suspect that some part shall have returned from Italy, they long meditated design to invade some part of his majesty's dominions, will be attempted, every exertion is making at the outposts, and in the king's yards to fit out and man armed vessels of every description. A hot press began on Monday, and still continues. It is imagined that the combined fleets will cruise on the West India station to deny off Admiral Gardner from before Brest, and that in the event of a general junction of the French fleets, a grand attack on England or Ireland will be the consequence.

"A levy on menses is expected to take place.—The city light horse are all out this morning.—The infantry volunteers are also assembling in their respective districts.—Every thing, in short, that evinces of importance to the safety of the country, are at hand.—God grant us a good deliverance!"

A London paper of the 15th of May has the two following articles:

Mr. Pitt has this morning informed the Agent for Jamaica, that government are aware of the danger which threatens the West India Islands, and lost no time in adopting measures for their protection; and exclusive of the force under Admiral Cochrane, naval and military aids have been sent out which will act according to circumstances.

Saturday we received a letter from an officer of the Diadem, from which we can assure our readers not only that the reiterated rumors to the effect that the pursuit of the French fleet had terminated at the evening of the 5th instant.

Directions for Preventing SUDDEN DEATH. FROM BOILING COLD WATER. OR COLD LIQUORS of any kind in Warm Weather.

1. Do not drink while you are warm. Or 2. Drink only a small quantity at once, and let it remain a short time in your mouth before you swallow it. Or 3. Grasp the vessel out of which you are about to drink, for a few minutes with both your hands. Or

4. Wash your hands and face, and rinse your mouth with cold Water before you drink. If these precautions have been neglected and the disorder incident to drinking the cold liquor hath been produced, give from 40 to 60 drops of liquid Laudanum in spirit and water or warm drink of any kind.

If these should fail of giving relief, the same quantity may be repeated every twenty minutes until the pain and spasms abate.

N. B. The dose of Laudanum is calculated for a grown person, and must be smaller for a child.

And whereas, not more than twenty dollars have been contributed by the third district (comprehending that part of the city and precincts, east of Halford run) for the support of the Dispensary for the present year.

Resolved, That if the third district should not, before the third Monday in September next, contribute to the support of the institution, the sum of 260 dollars, the managers will, at a meeting of the contributors, to be held at the said district shall any longer enjoy the benefits of the Dispensary.
