Extract of a letter from St. Thomas, dated June 10th, received from Mary, Monseigneur, arrived at Philadelphia.

"From present appearances there must be a considerable change of property in these Islands. The French have 30 sail of the line and frigates at Martinique. The British (it is said and believed) have 21 sail of the line at Barbadoes. The French Admiral has demanded the surrender of all the English Islands, in due form; if the British fleet has arrived, the answer will no doubt be a noisy one."

Jamaica, which is threatened by the French, was taken by the British from the Spaniards in 1656. Its annual exports are conjectured to amount to 12 or 15 millions of dollars. It's about 150 miles long, and 40 broad—and probably now contains 30,000 free inhabitants and near 200,000 slaves. If the blacks are attached to their masters, and will act heartily against the invaders, the French will be defeated at once; and if they cannot be trusted with arms by the British in defending the island, and it should be conquered, the French would experience with them in a short time, a repetition of the St. Domingo Tragedy.

Extract of a letter from London, dated May 10.

"I heard it this morning at one of the public offices, that government, having strong reasons to suspect that after Bonaparte shall have returned from Italy, the long meditated design to invade some part of his majesty's dominions, will be attempted, every exertion is making at the out-posts, and in the king's yards to fit out and man armed vessels of every description. A hot press began on Monday, and still continues—it is imagined that the combined fleets will arrive on the West India station to-morrow off Admiral Gardner from before Brest; and that in the event of a general junction of the French fleets, a grand attack on England or Ireland will be the consequence.

"A levy en masse is expected to take place.—The city light-houses are all out this morning.—The infantry volunteers are also assembling in their respective districts.—Every thing promises that events of importance to the safety of the country are at hand.—God grant us a good deliverance!"

And whereas, not more than twenty dollars have been contributed by the third district (comprehending that part of the city and suburbs, east of Harford river,) for the support of the Dispensary for the present year,

Resolved, That if the third district should not, before the third Monday in September next, contribute to the support of the institution, the sum of \$200 dollars, the managers will call a meeting of the contributors to consider whether said district shall any longer enjoy the benefits of the Dispensary.
