PARIS, April 29.

The army assembling in the celebrated Plain of Marigny will consist of 30,000 select men, which are to be reviewed by his Majesty the Emperor.

ALTONA, May 3.

It is positively asserted, that the king of Sardinia will be indemnified for the loss of Piedmont, by the Republic of the Seven Islands and Malta, of which, besides, he will be Grand Master. According to this plan, the states of this Prince will consist entirely of islands.

EGSTON, June 28.

NEILSON'S FLEET, &c.

Capt. Hall, who arrived yesterday from the Mediterranean, came through the Straits of Gibraltar, on the 6th of May, with Lord Nelson's Fleet, of 15 sail of the line, and parted off Cape St. Vincent, on the 9th of May.—It was reported at Malaga, by the captain of a Danish vessel, that off Sicily he had been board'd by two Tripolitan Corsairs; but it was not much credited, and no such news had reached Alicante or Gibraltar.

The above account of Lord Nelson's Fleet, (which may be depended on,) does not agree with the reports of it that have been spoken; but the intelligence of its arrival at Barbados, about the 1st of June, may be correct.

N.Y. July 2.

Captain Morris, in 4 days from Bordeaux, informs, that on the 21st May, an officer from the Guard-ship in that port, told him the Brethren sailors, at Janapar, on the 27th of that month,

Bordeaux papers to the 25th of May, have been received at this office, from which we have translated the following articles:

PARTS. 30 Florins.

Complaints have been made to his majesty of great frauds having been committed by the agents of the fleet. The emperor has, in consequence, given orders that a very strict enquiry is to be made into this matter.

Yesterday between eighty and a hundred boats were on the same ground, and about 6000 weight of drum was taken.—It is going indeed to penetrate every corner, and contribute much to the discontent of hundreds on the island.

We should not be surprised to see two hundred boats on the same ground this afternoon.

A scissortress, has been opened at Philipps Coffee House, Leader of the guard, and putting out to service the numerous seafarers occasioned at Gibraltar by the ravages of the late fever.

Capt. La Cleopatra, of the schooner Parry, who arrived yesterday from Berdeau, informs that on the 11th of May two ships of the line, fitted with troops, sailed from Rockport. Their destination was unknown at Rockport.

Before the last night, however, there had been a general translation throughout France, in consequence of the coronation of Bonaparte as King of Italy.

Order and discipline were the order of the day.

Not a gun or number of war

was heard in the harbor, while every

thing indicated prosperity, happiness and peace.

Extract of a letter from a Correspondent at Bermuda, to the Editor of the Morning Chronicle, received by the 25th Governor Gore, arrived on Monday,

BERMUDA, June 16th.

The Manhattan is waiting for a change of wind, to haul from her present situation in the harbour of St. George's into Murray's anchorage, when she can proceed to sea without any difficulty, as the men to navigate her (who are daily expected from New York) shall arrive.

On the 8th inst. Captain Beresford, of the Cambrian frigates, went on board and took away, or rather impressed, the boatswain, alighting, as a reason for his conduct, that he had understood he was an English subject; but said that on his arrival at New York, for which place he should sail immediately, he would give him an opportunity to prove his citizenship, and would restore him if he was satisfied that he was an American.

The Boatswain, whose name is Peter Anderson, had a protection (which Capt. B. refused to look at,) and he has a father and mother, wife and family, residing in some part of New York.

The schooner Baltimore which was captured 8th March last by the Cambrian, on her passage from St. Domingo to Baltimore, arrived here on the 20th following; but owing to the unaccountable delay in the Vice Admiralty court, and the indecision of the judge, (Dr. Terrett) her trial did not come on till the 17th May; and the decree, by which she was restored, was not given in till the 3d inst.

A similar loss of time was suffered before the Manhattan, and cargo were tried before the Manhattan, and cargo were tried and likewise with the brig Nancy,

which was detained on her passage from the Cape of Good Hope to Norfolk, on the 15th March, arrived here the 25th, and was tried the 1st inst. since when no further proof has been required by the judge; but she is restored to the claimant, on bail, and will sail for Norfolk in four or five days.

Arrived last evening, the Spanish-private schooner Mary, Anthony Lobo, master, mounting 8 guns, taken on her passage from Sandy Hook to Porto Rico, by the Boats of the Camorian fleet, and Driver ship of war, by bearing in a calm, in which three men belonging to the Cambrian were killed.

This privateer captured on the 24th inst. the ship Hunter, captain —, on her passage from Norfolk to Malta, laden with naval stores for the American squadron in the Mediterranean; and on the 15th inst. the ship Charles Carter, Captain —, bound from Wilmington, to Edenton, both of which were recaptured off the Island on the 24th inst. by two British Letters of Marque.

Two of the sailors belonging to the above mentioned ships, told me (besides what I have related) that the privateer had two puncheons of rum and a large hog on board, which had been plundered from American vessels near Sandy Hook, but they did not know to what port the letters of marque had ordered their

service.—On Sunday last after an illness of fifteen or twenty days, Mr. William Howeson, a young gentleman who had lately arrived from the city of Washington, for the purpose of filling the situation of principal Teacher of the Office of Discount and Deposit, about to be established in this place. The untimely death of this young gentleman is certainly felt by those who knew him here, and will be more particularly so to his family and numerous friends from whence he came; his talents and activity to business, will be a loss to the institution he was to be employed in.

ON TUESDAY.—On Monday last, about ten o'clock in the forenoon, a party magnificently assembled on the fishing ground opposite White Hall slip, not more than one hundred yards from the fort. Some wear on small boats and lines to catch small fish, and others with small lines and hooks.—Those who were not furnished with the latter, were soon obliged to cease fishing, or to fit themselves with strong twirling, for no sooner were the hooks down, than they were carried away by the drum. The twenty boats got from three to five drums each; but Mr. Thompson, boat-builder, took the lead.—It was on the ground only two hours, and out of 200 drums which he hooked, he caught 12, weighing from 30 to 50 lbs. We never heard of so many uses of this kind being caught in one afternoon. Most of the fish were given to the poor—many of them (the black drum) were equal in quality and flavor, to a salmon. It is supposed 150 fish, averaging 40 pounds, were caught at the above place in about two hours—making a total weight of four thousand pounds.

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KINGSTON, (Jam.) May 13.
