

You are to be particularly careful that the several articles of provisions to be in such case admitted, to be specified in the proclamation you may issue for that purpose, and you are not to extend the permission to any articles but those which cannot be supplied by the mother country, or the British colonies in North America; and in case any such articles (except lumber and provisions under the circumstances mentioned) shall be attempted to be introduced, you are to see that the necessary measures are taken for carrying full into execution the laws of navigation and for enforcing the penalties thereof against any ship or ships importing other articles than lumber and provisions regularly permitted.

You will take such steps as you may judge most expedient for making these directions generally known among the planters, merchants, and others whom it may concern; and in the event of its becoming necessary at any time to open the ports for supplies of lumber and provisions, you are particularly to insert in every proclamation you may issue for that purpose, notice to the following effect, viz. That if any other articles, except lumber and provisions, as therein specified, are attempted to be introduced from the United States of America, in American bottoms, measures will be taken for the forfeiture of the ship or vessel importing the same, and of the goods so imported, in contravention of the laws of navigation.

Federal liberty of the press. Mr. Ashly, editor of that excellent paper the Republican Spy, printed at Northampton, is indicted for publishing a libel on Governor Sprague, under the common law of England, which prohibits the truth being given in evidence. The federal paper in that place was also complained of for vilifying the President, &c. to the grand jury, (which consisted of 14 federalists and 4 republicans) who at first agreed to indict neither of the printers, but admonish them both, but were afterwards induced to indict the republican and let the federalist escape. This is the way they manage these matters (for this year only) in Massachusetts, where sauce for the goose is not always sauce for the gander. [Etc.]

The following is an extract of a letter from New-Orleans, dated May 25.

"I cannot close my letter without giving you a little hint of the great movements going on in our neighborhood. We had a vessel here the other day from Vera Cruz, which brings the following news:—We are here in the utmost perplexity—the governor and viceroys have quarrelled seriously; and the latter with the commerce of this place, who have sent home a deputy to plead their cause, and explain their business to the Council of the Indies. In the meantime the alarm is sounded, and his vicereignty has collected an army of near 30,000 strength, and is actually encamped there with one of the cliffs of Mount Orizava, and has caused all the public and private treasure of Mexico to be transported to the centre of the camp."—This alarm was caused by some news they had got either from this place or some part of the union, that the whole American army was under orders for the western line and this place, and that the president was to take the command in person, in case of urgent need. They further add, that a bishop ex-patriatus had arrived at Naquonedotch with seven hundred of the van-guard. Those who pretend to see further than the common sort, say, that the whole is a trick of the vice-king to get the cash-part of the property in his power, &c."

The Marquis of Lansdown's extensive entailed estates, both in England and Ireland amounting to more than 35,000l. per annum, devolve on his eldest son. Lord Wycombe, now Marquis of Lansdown, but 10,000l. per annum, and nearly 100,000l. in specie, are willed to his other son Lord Henry Petty. [London paper.]

A gentleman of our acquaintance, from the Westward, has furnished us with the following anecdote:—About five weeks past, a stranger of a tolerable genteel appearance, called on Mr. Willis How, a Gold-Smith, in the town of Richfield, in the County of Otsego, and after enjoining secrecy, engaged him to engrave a plate for printing Ten Dollar Bank Bills of the Farmer's Bank, and advanced him twenty dollars, and promised when the plate was delivered to pay him a larger sum. At the time fixed for finishing the plate, the stranger called, but it not being done, he concluded to tarry in the vicinity until it was completed. In the meantime Mr. How communicated it to three of his neighbors, who met at the time expected, and being discovered by him he fled with precipitation, and left in possession of How his Portmanteau, a Press and two kinds of Ink. Our informant added that he saw the articles left, but there was nothing by

Happening to be in one of his abstracted fits, he forgot to take it off, and wore it to the meeting house, where it was read with a great deal of astonishment by every person near him. A wag observed that his reverence only imitated the practice of traders, who put sign boards on their shops, on which is inscribed the name of the articles they deal most in;—but that the parson unluckily forgot to mention that he sold both at wholesale and retail!

The following extraordinary circumstance, we learn from Husum, of the 50th ult. lately occurred at Tonningen.—The master of an English vessel lying there, was ordered by the captain of the guard ship to slack his cable, which he did, till he could slack no more; he was then ordered to cut which he refused to do, saying, he would, or could not, if the king himself was there. In consequence of this reply, the Danish captain sent a party of men on board the English vessel, who brought the master on board the Danish ship, and he was there flogged severely, by order of their captain. The Dane in vindication of himself, said, he, the master of the English vessel, damned the king of Denmark; this charge has, however, been refuted by a number of witnesses who were present when the altercation took place. A petition, praying for redress, signed by about fifty English masters of vessels, has been sent to our ambassador at Copenhagen. [London Paper.]

As our paper was going to press, arrived the ship Glory, from New-Orleans, 43 days from Liverpool.—At the time captain Haynes sailed (14th May) there was a general embargo on all English vessels—says there was no English fleet in pursuit of the Tonkin and Cadiz fleets. Captain H. had late Liverpool papers, but we had not the good fortune to get any. We are told they are taken up with debates in the British parliament on Catholic emancipation. [Norfolk Herald.]

From the Merchants' Coffee-House Books.

Arrived last evening, schooner Amphion, Gimmel, 11 days from Gonaives—coffee and cotton—Lemuel Taylor. Sailed 25th ult. in company with sch'r Victory, McLaughlin, and St. Michael's, Shock, for Baltimore, left them in the Caicos passage. Left at Gonaives, Bark Packet of Philadelphia; sch'r Samuel, and Admiral, of do. brig Mary Louise, of Norfolk, all loaded and waiting convoy of ship Louisiana then at Port-au-Prince. The brig Orion, M Kea, of Baltimore, had arrived at Port-au-Prince from Jacmel. The sch'r Eclipse, Davis, of do. had gone to Petit Gave or Lanca Veaux. The Antelope, Gold, and St. Tammany, Wright, of do. were at Lanca Veaux waiting cargoes. The Stephen, Coward, of do. do. the Mohawk, and Eagle, of Norfolk, at Port-au-Prince, do. Captain of latter dead. The Nonpareil, Matchless, and Jane, arrived safe at Cape Fran-

cois 16th ult. from Baltimore. Off the Mole saw the brig Jane, Kennedy, of Baltimore, with three Pilot boat sch'rs under her convoy standing for Jeremie. The ship Marquis de Bonoralets, sailed from Cape Francois for Boston 20th ult. Saw no privateers on the passage.

Also, brig Joseph, Beard, 20 days from Porto Rico—sugar and coffee—Wm. and Hugh Neilson. Sailed 16th ult. in co. with sch'r Rhoda, for Philadelphia. Left ship Lydia, of and for New York uncertain; brig Wheeler, just arrived from Norfolk; brig —, Edwards, of Philadelphia unloaded, and a number of others, names not recollected. Heard that there has been several vessels carried into Maragua, the names of which we could not learn July 4, off the Capes spoke a Portuguese brig 72 days from Cape de Verde, bound to Philadelphia.
July 7.

The ship Vigilant, Meyer, hence, has arrived at Varel.
The Juno, de Jonge, hence to Amsterdam, has been detained and sent into Portsmouth.

The Toulon Fleet from 9 to 11 sail of the line were fallen in with about 20th June, 2 degrees southward of Bermuda, sailing N. E. They had parted with the Spanish fleet which had proceeded to Havana.

Arrived sch'r Mary Ann, Bennet, 20 days from St. Jago—Sugar and Coffee—Josh and Geo. Ward. Left there 16th ult. ship John and James, Langford, for Baltimore to sail 19th; brig Hero, Muirhead of New York, do. ship Fay, of do. of Philadelphia, loading; sch'r Sally, Watts, for Baltimore in a few days; sch'r Franklin, Jones, of N. York; Ann Snow, —; ship Governor Suong, Clark, of Alexandria, from Liverpool bound to N. Orleans, sent in by a French privateer, and after considerable detention, paying cost &c. was liberated. In lat. 23 30, long. 73 50, spoke sch'r Nancy, Grafton, of Salem from Philadelphia, and sch'r The Brothers, Griffin, of do. from Tennessee bound to New Orleans; passed a brig belonging to Charleston going up to St. Jago, she was bound to New Barcelona (Spanish Maine), not being permitted to land her cargo, she was to be captured by a French privateer, but through the exertions of the supercargo had been released. Markets dull. Flour and dry goods in abundance. Flour 17 a 13 dollars nominal. No sales but by small quantities.

June 10, was boarded by the British ship Diana, having in tow an American schooner from the Maia with specie, and a Spanish drogger, her prizes. June 13, was brought too with a shot, and boarded by the British ship Peterel, Capt. Lambourn, closely examined and treated in the most abusive manner—she pressed two Americans and a foreigner—and offered a bribe to say there was Spanish property on board. June 7, off Charleston, was boarded by the French privateer Antelope, and treated politely. Passengers, Messrs. Abadonone, Richardson, Peters, Place, Martel, and Capt. Williams; and 8 in the cargo.

Brig Eagle, Terry, in 45 days, from Bordeaux. Spoke June 2, in lat. 43, long. 37, 30, the ship Jugenia, 15 days from New York for Bordeaux; and the same day, the ship Columbian Packet, from N.
