On Thursday our national anniversary was celebrated with a festivity and splendor that has not been equalled for many years. The Nationai Standard was displayed from the Battery at sun rise. National salutes were exchanged between the city and the garrison of Fort Jay, on Governor's island, at sun rise, at noon, and at sun set. The first brigade of artillery, under brigadier general Morton, the legion of uniform. ed infantry, under lieutenant colonel Steddiford, with cavairy, under command of major Lawrence; paraded on the battery and went through the customary manoeuvres. His excellency the commander in chief (Governor Lewis) review. ed the military in person, attended by un jor general Stevens, and brigadier general Boyd, with the officers of their respective staff. The parade was much more numerous than on any former occasion, and his excellency expressed great satisfaction at the appearance and dici-Pline of both officers and men. After the review, the military took up the line of march, and proceeded through some of the principal streets which were lined with spectators. They were followed by a procession, composed of several public pocieties. On their return to the battery the line fired a fue de joie in honor of the day, and were dismissed.

Several public and private entertainments were given in the afternoon. The Cincinnati society dined together according to custom.-The officers of the brigade of artiller; had an elegant entertainment at M chanic Hall, where they were henored with the company of the governor and lieutenant governor. The corporation had a grand dinner at the City Hall, in the room of the supreme court, which was elegant. ly and funcifully decorated for the occasion, with busts and statues belonging to the acade. my of arts, valuable paintings, and a grove of lemon and orange trees from the collection of Mr. Grant Thornburn. The public gardens were illuminated in the evening, and a brilliant displict of fire works was exhibited at Vauxhall. Upon the whole, theday was celebrated in a style of unusual splendor and festivity.

N. Y. Morning Chronicle.

The following account of an attempt to destroy Louis 18th, the prince of Angouleine, and other branches of the Bourbon, family is from a late London paper.

MITTAU, April 8. Yesterday a fire breke out about two o'clock in the morning, in the wing of the castle, principally inhabited by the general of artillery, and a Lattalien under his command. In a short time the l'ames had made such a progress that assistance was nearly useless. If the wind had blown from the west the entire castle would have been a prey to the flames. Ivlessrs, the governor, the deputy governor, and the members of the administration, shewed themselves every where with the greatest zeal, as well as to clear away a magazine of powder, the proximity of which was very dangerous. A party wall, which separated the most elevated part of the wing that was on fire, and which kept back the flames, happily arrested their progress by facilitating the action of the engines.

The count de Lille, who had awoke at the first beat of the drum, remained the whole night on his feet, surrounded by -is highness the duke d'Angouleme and the officers of his suite. Fortunately, the gout, which had decreased, did not prevent his walking about and giving the necessary orders.

About 5 o'clock in the morning, at the - moment when every person was besy in stopping or examining the progress of the principal fire, a smoke was perceived issuing from the extremity of the wing that was on fire, precisely at the angle which joined this wing to the body of the castle. On entering a small detached chamber_they found under a large camp bed, a heap of small billets of wood and

lighted rags on the floor. The boards

and part of the bedsteads were already on

fire, and in a moment the flames would have become general.

This morning, April 8, smoke was perceived over the apartments occupied by the count de Lille, which are situated opposite to the wing that has been burnt. The chief of police, and many others, having gone into the garrets, found there, near the fire place, an earthen pot, with the remains of some charcoal, burned rags and the floor on fire; fortunately they were able to extinguish it.

Messrs, the governor d'Arseniew, and the commander of the battalion of fusileers, with one of the principal officers attached to the count de Liile, were witnesses to the new attempt, as they were also to the preceding one.

Undoubted proof has been given of these facts by the governor general count de Buxden, who, at the first news of this disaster, went from Siga to Mittau. He examined every thing himself, and gave with the greatest activity the necessary orders for the safety of the castle, where every thing is now quiet-The fire still burns, but only among the rubbish.
