"The people of Upper Louisiana appear to be much pleased with the new mode of government which they are to come under next fall, agreeably to the late acts of congress.

"Six of captains Lewis' and Clark's men have arrived at St. Louis, and about 20 Indians of different tribes, who have never been in a settlement of whites before. They live from 1000 to 1685 miles up the Missouri, and on their way to see Mr. Jefferson, intending to leave these parts in a very short time.—When these men left captains Lewis and Clark, they were just about to leave their winter encampment, and pursue their journey to the Pacific Ocean, which they supposed to be about as much further off as they had gone from the mouth of the Missouri."
