The recent accounts by Americans who have been at St. Domingo, concerning the government of the blacks, does not present so flattering a picture, as might be conceived from a consideration of their recent constitution. We have obtained a copy of their military code, which we mean to translate and publish to-morrow. This code and the constitution lately published, are said to be the production of general Menter, formerly a deputy to the national convention, aided by Boisrond, Tonner and Chanlatte, all blacks, and who are the draughtsmen of the emperor Dessalines' Proclamations. The biography of the black chiefs, if we can rely up on report, is a curious evidence of the instability of human affairs, and an important lesson to the vanity of men. The " first Emperor of Hayti," is represented as being a sweeper of the government house at the Cape, general Christophe is said to have been butler to general Ro chambeau the elder, during the American revolution. Vernet, the minister of the finances, was an handicrast man, some say a taylor; and it is stated that none of these chief officers can read or write; and the emperor himself is represented as very recently engaged in going over his ab it ob, &c. under the tuition of wards Europe. 14th, two brigs from his secretary Clervcaux; generals Petion Newbern, N. c. for Barbadoes. 16th, and Giffrard, are said to have been silver smiths; they are both mulattoes, and; command the southern divisions, doubts! are entertained of their fidelity to the imperial regime; and the same hatred which subsisted when Tousaint and * * * * * * * * * * were prominent characters, has not subsided between the blacks and mulattoes. The blacks are the most numerous, but the mulattoes are the most intelligent and best instructed, and compared with the blacks are more exemplary moralists, a quality described to be very rare in the empire. Contrary to what would seem to be dictated by every obligation of prudence and policy, the practical cultivators are said to be treated with great inhumanity; and among that class we are told from very respectable authority, a very general and sincere wish prevails for the return of the ancient masters, or any masters rather than the present. The government of the blacks is not as full of confidence in its security or duration, as their constitution and rescripts would seem to indicate. Their military ! code is rigid and severe; and even flushed as they have been, by the expulsion of Rochambeau, and the possession of all the ancient French ports and territory, they proved their want of dicipline & courage before the walls of the city of St. Domingo; where their numbers were ten times greater than that of the force by which they were attacked. Above 2000 Spaniards taken by the blacks from time to time, in the neighbourhood of St. Domingo city, have been sent prisoners to the interior, and have been; employed on the plains of Artibonite, and on the fort of Champ Marchaud, whither the emperor contemplates to retire in the last resort of an attack by a French army or domestic insurgents. Under this condition of the Island, the certainty of any state of things cannot be long calculated upon. The ab-- sence of the French armies, or the confinement of Ferrand's force to the city of St. Domingo, has contributed to revive cultivation for the time; and the crops of augar promise to be considerable, that of coffee unusually plentiful. Nevertheless folk in 10 days; bri Sisters, Williams, the black government owes to the Ameri-Cans who have had credulity to trust them more than three millions of coffee, and have not good faith to pay. 
