

Extract of a letter, dated Amsterdam, June 31, 1803, to a gentleman in New York.

"No doubt you have heard of the general conflagration of the town of Detroit; not a single house escaped the fury of the devouring element.

"It commenced in the large frame house built by Mr. Jacob Schieffelin, of your city, at 9 o'clock, A. M. and at half past 12 P. M. the whole was consumed—a light wind from the W. S. W. The only building standing is a stable of Mr. McIntosh's, and the black house over the western gate—fortunately the troops have Fort Lamont, for their quarters.

The following interesting narrative has been received in New York, from Capt. in Lee Smith, of the brig Iris, of that port, on his passage to Liverpool, dated At Sea, Tuesday morning, June 25th, in lat. 41, 30, N. long. 57, W.

"DEAR SIR, "On Sunday last, in lat. 41, 50, long. 58, 30, I fell in with the brig Lion, of New York, a wreck, having no mast standing, no bowsprit, her head on, one mast alongside, her quarter boards all good, her bulwarks nearly gone, and one anchor on the fore-castle. A Boston brig was fast to her, and had been so for 24 hours; the men on board were cutting up the decks to get out the cargo. She was level with the water a midships, quarter deck all above water though she was full. I knowing her, told the master of the Boston brig her name, the captain's name, how long she had been out, and whether she was bound, desiring him to be particular in reporting her immediately on his arrival. He told me they had found one dead man on board, and that every thing appeared as if she had been struck with lightning. She sits upright as a dish; and this brig will no doubt get a great deal out of her, as she was light. I told the captain that the Lion had two good boats on board when she left New York; and, as so many articles were left unwashed away from the deck, I was in hopes the crew had been fortunate enough to effect their escape. If any of them are gone in the boats, I pray God they may arrive at some port in safety. I am, sir, your humble servant,

LEE SMITH. "P. S. I should have gone on board, to see the body of the dead man; but the wind blew fresh, and night was fast approaching.

"Should this be the first intelligence of this distressing event, be so kind as to inform the wife and family of captain Clark, who reside at Brooklyn, and with whom I am an intimate.

"I send this by the brig Star, captain Simmons, for Providence, R. I."

Left, July 6, the ship Lucia, West, to sail for Boston in 10 days; ship Voltaire, from Philadelphia via Charleston, had just arrived in company with a brig not known; ship John Jones, Sherry, to sail for New York in 3 days; brig Mars, Greely; brig —, Blunt, and schr. —, Givan, all just arrived from Portland; schooner Molly, Dennis, to sail next day for Marblehead, ship Polly, Harris, of Boston, to sail in 15 days for New York; schooner Honest Tom, in 5 days for Philadelphia; ship Eugenia, just arrived from Boston; brig America, Ehrenstorm, to sail in 5 days for Campeachy; ship Susannah, to sail in 10 or 15 days for New York; brig Three Sisters, for Bristol, Rhode Island, in 7 days; ship Tyre, Mathewson, of Providence, for Boston in 15 days; sloop Nancy, Hamilton, to sail next day for Baltimore; ship Palmyra, just arrived from Boston, and about 40 sail from the different ports, lately arrived.
