To provide for the trial of facts in the government as relate to the general court and court of appeals.

DF. it enacted by the general assembly of Mar, land, That this stare stall be Errided uito six judicial distriels in manner and form following, to wit: St. Mary's, Charles and Prince George's crunties, shull be the hist district; (wii, Kent, Queen Anne's and Talket counties, shall be the second district; Ca'vert, Anne Arundel and Montgomery equaties, shall be the third district : Caroline, Borchester, Sometset and Worcester coupties, shall be the fourth district; Frederick, Washington and Allegary, counties, shall be the fifth district ; Beitimote and Harford counties shall be the sixth dist. ct; and there shall be appointed, for each of the sad judicial district, three persons of mite. grity and sound legal knowledge, residents of the state of Maryland, who shall previous to and during their acting as Judges reside in the district for which they shall respectively be appointed, one 'of whom: shall be styled in the con.mission chief judges and the other two associate judger, of the distr &t for which they shall be appeinted; and the chief judge, together with the two associate judges, shall compose the county courts in cach tespective district; and each fudge siall hald his commission during good behavior, removable for misbehavior on conviction in a court of law, or shell be removed by the governor, upon the address of the general assembly, provided that two thirds of all the menibersof each house concur in suchaddress; and the county courts, so as sforess destablished, shall have, hold and exercise, in the reverst counties of this siste, all and every the powers, authorities and jurisdictions, which the county courts of this state now have, use and exercice, and which shall be hereafter prescribed by law ; said the said-county courts established by this aclesball respectively bold | 108.
