Ordered, That the act to provide for the trial of facts in the several counties of this state, and to alter, change and abo lish, all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the general court and court of appeals be published twice in each week, for the space of three months in the Maryland Gazette at Annapelis; the American, Telegraphe and the Federal Gazette at Baltimore; the National Intelligencer; the Republican Advocate and Bartgis's paper at Frederick Tuwn; Greeves's paper at Hagers Town, and in Smith's and Cowau's paper at Easten.

To provide for the trial of facts in the several counties of this state, and to alter, change and abelish, all such parts of the constitution and forms of

government as relate to the general court and court of appeals. DE it enacted by the general assembly of 1) Maryland, That this state shall be divided into six judicial districts in manners and form following, to wit: St. Marr's Charles and Prince George's Kant, Queen Anne's and Talbot coun-Airs, shall be the second districh; Ca!vert, Anne Arundel and Montgemery counties, shall be the third districh; Caroline, Dorchester, Somerset and Worcester counties, shall be the feurth districa; Frederick, Washington and Allegeny counties, shall be the fifth digtriel: Baltimore and Hersord counties shall be the sixth district; and there shall be appointed, for each of the said judicial districts, three persons of integrity and sound legal knowledge, residente of the state of Maryland, who shall previous to - and during their acting as julgasizeside in the district for which Atty shall respectively be appointed, one of whom shall be styled in the commiswion chief judge, and the other two as ociate judget, of the district for which they shall be appointed; and the chief judge, together, with the two associare judges, shall compose the county bourts in esch rexpective district; and each Audgo shall hold his commission during grodt behavior, temovable for misbehavior on conviction in a court of law, or shall be removed by the governor, upon the addition of the general assembly, provided that two thirds of all the membersofeach bouse concur in such address; and the county courts, so as aforesaidestablished, shall bave, hold and exercise, in the several counties of this state, all and every the powers, authorities and jurisdictions, which the county courts of this state now have use and exercise, and the which shalle be hereaster prescribed by: Jaw 1, and the said county courts esta-

blished by this act shall respectively bold

their sessions in the several counties at such times and places as the legislature shall direct and appoint, and the salaries of the said judges shall not be diminished during the period of their continuance in

II. And be it enacted, That in any suit or action at law hereafter to be commenced or instituted in any county court of this state, the judges thereof, upon suggestion in writing by either of the parties thereto, supported by affidavit or other proper evidence, that a fair and impartial trial cunnot be had in the county court of the county where such suit or action is depending, shall and may order and direct the record of their proceedings in such suit or action to be transmitted to the judges of any county court within the district for trial, and the judges of such county court, to whom the said record shall be traismitted, shall hear and determine the same in like will prove interesting and entertaining. Tho manner as if such suit or action had been originally instituted therein; provided, nevertheless, that such suggestion shall be made as aferesaid before or durirg the term in which the issue or issues may be joined in the said suit or action : and provided also, that such further remedy may be provided by law, in the premises, as the legislature shall from time to time direct and enach.

III. And be it enucted, That if any party presented or indic'ed in any of the county courts of this flate, shall suggest in writing to the court in which such prosecution is depending, that a fair and impartial trial cannet be had in such court, it stall and may be lawful for the said court to order knowledge of the destructive effects of Vesuvi and direct the record of their proceedings in the said prosecution to be transuitted to the judges of any adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of fuch adjoining county court 'liall tear and detersuch portentous aspects of barrenness and ruin, mine the same, in the same nanner as if fuch profecution had been originally inflituted thegein: provided, that such further and other remedy may be provided by law in the premiles as the legislature may direct and enach.

> IV. And be it enacted, That if the attorney-general or the profecutor for the state, stall suggest in writing to any courty court, before whom an indichment is or may be depending, that the flate cannot have a fair and impartial trial in such court, it shall and may be lawful for the faid court, In their discretion, to order and direct the record of their proceedings in the faid prosecusion to be transmitted to the juages of any adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of fuch county court shall hear and determine the same as if such producution had been originally instituted therein

V. And be it enacted, That there shall be a court of appeals, and the same shall be composed of the chief judges of the several judicial dittricts of the state, which faid court of appeals fiall hole, ute and exercise, all and singular the percers, authorities and jurisdictions, Leretofore bela, used and exercised by the court of appeals of this fate, and sife the appellate jurnaletion heretofore used and exercited by the general court; and the faid court of arpeals hereby effablisten, fall fit un the western and eastern thores for transacting and determining the buliness of the refpeclive shores, at such times and places as the suture legislature of this bate stail direct and appoint, and any three of the faid judges of the court of appeals fhall form a quorum to hear and decide in all cases pending in said court; and the judge who has given a decision in any cale in the county court, flall withdraw from the bench upon the deciding of the same case before the court of appeals; and the judges of the court of appeals may appoint the cierks of laid court for the weltern and eastern shores respectively, who that! hold their appointments during good betra vior, removeable only for missenavior on conviction in a court of law; and in cafe of death, refignation, discrealistication, or removal out of the flate, or from their rel peblise shores, of either of the said clerks counties, shall be the first district; Cacil, in the varation of the faid court, the governor, with the advice of the council, may appoint and commission a sit and proper person to such vacant office, to hold the same until the next meeting of the faid court ; and all laws passed after this aci stall take essect, stall be recorded in the office of the court of appeals of the well-

VI. And be it enacted, That all and every part of the conflicution and, form of government which relates to the court of appeals and the general court, or the judgethereof, or that is in any manner repugnant to, or incontillent with, the provilions of this act, be and the same is hereby repealed, abrogated and annulled, upon the consirmation hereof; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to authorise the removal of the clerks of the respective county courts being in commission at the time of the passing of this ael, in any other mode or manner than that prescribed by the constitution and form of government.

VII. And be it enacted, That if this aft stall be confirmed by the general assembly after the next election of delegates, in the first sellion after such new election, as t'e constitution and form of government direcla, that in such case this att, and this alterations and amendments of the conflitution and form of government therein contained, shall be taken and considered, and shall continue and be valid, as a part of the said consistution and form of goz. vernment, to all intents and purpoles, any at our auction rooms previous to the sale, and the thing in the said consiststion and form of terms; which will be very accommodating.
