WAR WITH TRIPOLI.

A letter from Malta, of April 19, says, preparations for the Tripoline expedition were then making with great activity. A vessel had been dispatched with military stores for the claimant of the Bashawship, who was to be enabled to attempt to regain his rights, and was to attack Tripoli by land, while the American squadron bombarded it from the sea. The united effort against the hostile usurper, the present Bashaw was probably made in June.

We have it from undoubted authority, that accounts are received in this place by the ship Minerva, from Cadiz, as late as the 2d of June, stating, "that the mission of Col. Munroe and Mr. Pinckney to the Court of Madrid had ended, and that not being able to bring the Spanish Government to accord on any one point, either as relates to CLAIMS of Territory, Spoilations, or the Convention of August, 1802, Mr. Munroe had demanded his passport, and was about to leave Madrid immediately for London. The dispatches on this business have gone forward to the president, via Lisbon, and by the Cotton Planter to New York."

We learn by Mr. HARROD, supercargo of the ship Hannah, from Trieste and Gibraltar, that the U. S. schooner Enterprise, Capt. Robertson, has been entirely rebuilt at Venice, and would be ready to sail for Syracuse the 10th M. Y.

The U. S. frigate Boston (U. S. Constitution being in cog) captured a Tripolitan cruiser and took two Neapolitan vessels, her prizes, and carried into Malta.

INDIAN WAR.—A letter received in this city on Tuesday last, from a respectable gentleman at Detroit, (dated 24th of June) states, that "the Sock Indians and Ojwas have sent in their chiefs to council at Mellen.—They are spreading the war belt in every direction—their object is war with the Osages on the Mississippi. They applied for the assistance of the Hurons, who answered, that they were in treaty of peace (made at Greenville) with the United States; that they had buried the hatchet, and would not take it up again. The Socks and Ojwas replied, "we shall know how to treat you when we come forward." The Osages it is said will claim the protection of West Louisiana; and it is believed, that the United States will be involved in the war. The troops ought to be returned to this place, and the fortifications strengthened. We are indeed, in a miserable situation for defence—the citadel in ashes, the fort deserted, and only a few straggling soldiers about the shipyards."

The letter from which the above intelligence was taken, contains a description of the sufferings to which the inhabitants of Detroit have been reduced by the late conflagration of their village. "About seventy families," says the letter, "are left without a roof to shelter them; with the ground for their bed, and the heavens for their canopy; yet we are not in despair—a spirit of industry appears again to pervade all ranks, and I hope, that by the assistance that will be obtained from the affluent, Detroit will flourish once again."

The inhabitants have appointed a committee to estimate the damages, and to solicit and receive contributions for the relief of their unfortunate town. We resume the affluent and charitable city.

Extract of a letter, dated Trinidad, June 18, to a gentleman in Charleston.

"We are in daily expectation of the complete reduction of the French in these seas.—Since the arrival of their first marauding expedition, and the second under Gravina, their force was such as to give them something of a mastery on the water, to which they had not been accustomed. We have frequently been in hourly expectation of them. On the 17th inst. the signal for a hostile squadron was made from the heights—from their number, (about 14 ships of the line) we expected they would land about 7000 troops. The coast having been lined with our troops, and we in immediate expectation of immolating them in their boats, an express arrived, stating that the supposed enemy was Lord Nelson, who had pursued the French from the Mediterranean, and expected to have traced them to Trinidad. He is now in pursuit of them and no doubt will give a good account of them.

"Trinidad is a most valuable island, and highly productive, a very small part is, however, as yet cultivated. The colonists speak of it as a island which will rival even Jamaica at a day not far distant."
