It is a maxim which has been long eftaidilled, that " ignorance of the land excult b no man;" and the reason of it is obvious: For if ignerance of the land were admitted as a jutt plea, laws would be without force, and corfequently useless. As it is out of the power of aur govern. ment to promuise te its laws in such a way as to communicate them to every individani of the community, it is necessary for every man to fernich himself with the means of information to a degree sufficient to enable him to difcharge the duties of his station as a citizen or a free state. This is what he owes to his country. To Limse's he owes more. It is every man's interesi to be a quainted with the laws of his own government sufficiently to enable him to a mid t'e finals and quickfands of legal controversy, on which ignorance of the law might throw him, and occasion the wreck of his fortune, and, perhaps, of his happiness likewise. It is not only every men's interest, but it is every man's daty to his family to endeaver to underfland erough of the acts of affembly and of the forms and proceedings in the administre ion of justice, to enable him to preserve hie estate in elegal way, transact in a proper marrer the befiness of life according to ruie, to he able to recover his debts; and he aught to know the relative duties of one citizen to another.

The above work is an attempt to convey to the people of Maryland in as concise a marrer as possible, correct knowledge of the provisions of those acts of assembly which are mest necessary to be known and understood by the citizens of the state at large, together with tome common law principles which are in force in Maryland.
