Extract of a letter, dated Georgetown, (Col.) July 20, 1805.

GIR, This day, about 11 o'clock, as Mr. John Peter, an officer of the bank of Columbia, was on his way and within two miles of Alexandria, with checks and notes to a considerable amount, he was shot, and robbed of the whole, by a ruffian of nearly the following description:—He was a little below the common size, about 35 or forty years of age—had on a blue coat, white or manken pantaloons & vest, with shoes and a black hat.

Mr. P. was conveyed to Alexandria a little after. The ball is extracted, and he is supposed to be in a fair way of recovery. My reason for giving you this information is, that you may be on the look-out, for the scoundrel, as it is possible he may endeavor to take his passage from Baltimore for the eastward.

A very handsome reward, no doubt, will be given, both by the mayors of Georgetown and Alexandria, as well as by the bank, for the apprehension of the above villain. Officers of the police here will do well to apprehend any suspicious character, and have him examined.

Literary Intelligence. MR. HON. MAXWELL, of this city, printer, has at present in the press Lord Strangford's Translation of the Minor Poems of Camoens. These beautiful poems have already had a third edition in London, and their popularity still increases. The British critics speak highly, but not extravagantly in their praise, & with some confidence assert them to be the original productions of the noble translator himself. It would appear strange that a poet should thus needlessly deprive himself of the valuable reputation which the production of such poems must procure to him, if we did not know the modesty of true genius. There seems to be no good reason to doubt the assertions of the reviewers, one of whom has, perhaps truly said, that Camoens could not have written them. This is indeed high applause, but no one who may read them will deny it to be just. They possess all the delicacy and the grace of Little's poetry, without its voluptuousness:—they have the harmony of Pope, the sweetness of Goldsmith, and the pensive pathos of Collins, with the playful sprightliness of Little, & after repeated perusals, it may yet be doubtful whether Moore or Strangford be the better poet.
