NEW-LONDON, (Conn.) July 24.

On Monday last was committed to prison, in this city, WILLIAM STILL, of Lyme (north quarter) for the murder of his father-in-law, Capt. WILLIAM STERLING. The following are some particulars of the lamentable affair: Mr. Still has for a number of years been troubled with the hypochondria...

Mr. Still is said to be, when enjoying his reason, an excellent citizen—tender and affectionate to his family and connections. No previous threat or intimidation of his intention escaped him. Capt. Sterling was about 67 years old—In him the community has lost one of its most useful members; and a numerous family are left to deplore their untimely loss.

NEW-YORK, July 30. Particulars of the loss of the brig Lion, of New-York.

We have been favored by captain Clark, late master of the Lion, with the following particulars of the loss of that vessel, drawn up by himself. Nothing particular occurred on our voyage, except having head winds and bad weather until the 8th of June; when we were surrounded with squalls, and it came on to blow a gale. On the 10th it moderated, and the wind hauled round from S. E. to S. S. W.

Letters from Gottenburgh say that Russia has taken off all negotiations with France, and that the troops of the former power will soon take an advanced position in Pomerania. The Prussian minister had actually left Stockholm. The squadron under the command of Admiral Salgado, that sailed from Carthage, returned again into the port, having met with the fleet of Lord Nelson, and that some of the Spanish ships in their haste to get into the harbor again, were damaged.

LONDON, June 7. The squadron of 15 sail of the line, stationed in the Downs, is to act as occasion may require in the narrows of the channel, or in the north sea. The squadron of Admiral Russel, which lately blockaded the Texel, is ordered round to make a part of this armament.

Yesterday arrived his Britanic majesty's Packet, Princess Elizabeth, from Falmouth, Eng. via Halifax, with the June mail. She sailed from Falmouth on the 14th June, and brings London papers to the 10th. PHILADELPHIA, July 31. HEALTH-OFFICE, July 30.

In order to obviate the alarm which a misrepresentation of the circumstance might excite, the board of health deem it expedient to publish the following statement: Upon last Saturday the 26th inst. Peter Young, about --- years of age, living in Crissman's, at the corner of Water & Catharine-street, was affected with chillness, head ache, and the other symptoms common to the first stage of all febrile diseases; upon the succeeding day, Joseph George and Tobias Smith, both resident in the same family, were effected in a manner nearly similar.

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Veritas, in the American of this day seems to lash hard at republicanism—that species of it we would support, we hope, does not merit his stripes. The term republicanism, we conceive, ought to convey a signification, distinct and conclusive; although, we have it in remembrance, that it has been declared “to mean any thing, or nothing.” We do not know in what sense Veritas views the subject of his strictures, but if in one of its compound shapes, we hope, at any rate, it is the one opposite to that we advocate—Democratic-republicanism. Veritas says, truly, that “republicanism is the rights of man, yea verily and woman too”—and such designation we would sanction with all our might and strength; but we should weep for the fallen liberties of our country, if we could for a moment calculate, that we had “fallen on such evil times,” as to induce us to believe, with Veritas, that the American people were as much divested of republicanism, as the “guady courts of princes, or the insolent governments of despots.” Indeed, such insinuations we reprobate, as being highly disrespectful, if not slanderous, both towards the people and government of our country. Veritas, as we before observed, founds his republicanism on the “rights of man”—and does not every citizen enjoy the privileges flowing from such republicanism, under the present administration? The falsehood would be too daring and absurd to answer no.

Veritas states, among other requisites to constitute republicanism “the equality of man.” If he wishes it established on the agrarian system, which originated in ancient times, under a Roman republic; and which, at a more modern date, was projected in France; or if he desires any other similar system, we think, indeed, that he will never see his republicanism perfect—but if he views equality in its fair political aspect it certainly exists completely in our happy country, with the exception of negro-slavery—a stain, we admit, on the charter of our rights which the present republicanism of our country, will, no doubt, remove, as soon as existing constitutional and insuperable obstructions will admit.

Veritas proceeds further to delineate republicanism—He combines, with truth, in its sacred principle, the will of the people to establish laws and appoint legislatures, and it is their privilege to destroy those laws when found to be erroneous, &c. &c.

We would here conclude, after observing, that in our conception, the greater part of Veritas, seems to apply so little to any thing of a political nature, or any other specific subject; that we profess ourselves unable to discover, what were the views which gave it birth; we will, however, hazard the opinion, that the sentiments of our readers, would have conceived it quite as appropriate, had it been entitled, “The whole duty of man—towards his neighbor.”—at least, the former part, appears more like a moral lecture, than the discussion of an abstract political question.

The Danish government has notified to the American Consul at Hamburg, that all vessels for Copenhagen coming from Norfolk, Philadelphia, Wilmington and Savannah, shall be strictly examined, and if from Charleston, they shall be obliged to perform a rigorous quarantine—but those coming from any other port in the United States, will be admitted, on immediate entry, provided with a clean bill of health.
