AN ACT

To provide for the trial of facts in the several counties of this state, and to alter, change and abolish, all such parts of the constitution and forms of government as relate to the general court and court of appeals.

DE it enacted by the general assembly of Mariland, That this state shall be divided into six judicial districts in manner and form following, to wit; St. Mary's, Charles and Prince George's counties, shall be the first district; Cecil, Kent, Queen Anne's and Talkot counties, shall be the second district; Ca!vert, Anne Arundel and Montgomery counties, shall be the third district; Caroline, Dorchester, Somerast and Worcester counties, shall be the fourth distriQ; Frederick, Washington and Allegany counties, shall be the fifth district; Baltimore and Harford counties shall be the sixth district; and there shall be appointed, for each of the said judicial districts, three persons of integrity and sound legal knowledge, residents of the state of Maryland, who shall previous to and during their acting as judges, reside in the district for which they shall respectively be appointed, one of whom shall be styled in the commission chief judge, and the other two associate judges, of the district for which they shall be appointed; and the chief judge, together with the two associate judges, shall compose the county courts in each respective district; and each judge shall hold his commission during good behavior, removable for misbel.a. vier en convistion in a court of law, er shall be removed by the governor, upon the address of the general assembly, N B. The books remain at the cld stand, provided that two thirds of all the members of each house concur in such address; and the county courts, so as aforesaid es- recls, that in fuch cufe this act, and the tablished, shall have, hold and exercise, in the several counties of this state, all and every the powers, authorities and jurisdictions, which the county courts of this state now have, use and exercise, and which shall be hereafter prescribed by law; and the said county courts established by this act shall respectively hold their sessions in the several counties at such times and places as the legislature shall direct and appoint, and the salaries of the sain judges shall not be diminished during the period of their continuance in

> II. And de it enacted, That in any suit or action at law hereafter to be commenced or instituted in any county court of this state, the judges thereof, upon suggestion in writing by either of the parties thereto, supported by affidavit or other proper evidence, that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had in the county court of the county where such suit or action is depending, shall and may order and direct the record of their proceedings in such suit or action to be transmitted to the judges of any county court within the district for trial, and the judges of such county court, to whom the said record shall be transmitted, shall hear and determine the same in like marner as if such suit or action had been originally instituted therein; previded, nevertheless, that such suggestion shall be made as aforesaid before or during the term in which the issue or issue's may be joined in the said suit or action : and provided also, that such further remedy may be provided by law, in the premises, as the legislature shall from time to time direct and enact.

And be it enacted, That if any party presented or indicted in any of the county courts of this flate, shall suggest in writing to the court in which fuch profecution is depending, that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had in such court, it shall and may be lawful for the faid court to order and direct the record of their proceedings in the said prosecution to be transmitted to the judges of any adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of fuch adjoining county court 'shall hear and determine the same, in the same manner as if tuch prosecution had been originally inslituted the rein : provided, that such further and other remedy may be provided by law in the premitee as the legislature may direct

IV. And be it enacted, That if the attorney-general or the prosecutor for the state, shall singgest in writing to any county court, before whem an indistment is or may be depending, that the flate cannot have a fair and impartial trial in such court, it thall and may be lawful for the faid court, in their discretion, to order and direct the record of their proceedings in the said prosecution to be transmitted to the judges of any adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of fuch county court shall hear and determine the same as if such prosecution lud been griginally inslituted therein.

V. And be it enacted, That there shall be a court of appeals, and the same shall be composed of the chief judges of the several judicial districts of the state, which faid court of appeals shall hold, ule and exercise, all and singular the powers, authorities and jurisdictions, heretosore held, used and exercised by the court of appeals of this flate, and also the appellate jurisdiction heretofore used and exercised by the general court; and the faid court of appeals hereby enablified, fl.all fit on the wellern and easiern mores for transacting and determining the bufiness of the reipective thores, at fuch times and places as the future legislature of this trate shall direct and appoint, and any three pf the said judges of the court of appeals shall form a quorum to bear and éccide in all cases pending in said court; and the judge who has given a decifien in any cafe in the county court, fhall withdraw from the bench upon the deciding of tile same case before the court of appeals; and the judges of the court of appeals may appoint the clerks of faid court for the wellern and eastern shores respectively, who shall hold their appointments during good beha vior, removeable only for mishet avior on conviction in a court of law; and in case of death, resignation, disquaissication, or removal eut of the flate, or from their relpeclise fhores, of either of the faid clerks in the vacation of the faid court, the governor, with the advice of the council, may appoint and commission a six and proper perfen to fuch vacant office, to hold the faire until the next meeting of the faid court; and all laws puffed after this act frail tale effect, ffall be recorded in the office of the court of appeals of the west-

VI. And be it encerted, That all and every part of the conflitution and form of government which relates to the court of appeals and he general court, or the judgethereof, or that is in any manner repugmant to, or inconfident with, the provideons of :1 is ach, be and the same is hereby repealed, abrogated and annulled, upon the confirmation lescof; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed fo as to authorife the removal of the clerks of the respective county courts being in commission at the time of the passing of this act, in any other mode or manner than that prescribed by the conflictation an! form of government.
