AN ACT

To provide for the trial of facts in the several counties of this state, and to alter, change and abolish, all such parts of the constitution and forms of government as relate to the general court and court of appeals.

DE it enacted by the general assembly of Maryland, That this state shall be divided into six judicial districts in manner and form following, to wit: St. Mary's, Charles and Prince George's counties, shall be the first districh; Cecil, Kent, Queen Anne's and Talkot counties, shall be the second districh; Calvert, Anne Arundel and Montgemery counties, shall be the third districh-: Caroline, Dorchester, Somerset and Worcester counties, shall be the fourth districh: Frederick, Washington and A"egany counties, shall be the fifth district : Bastimore and Harford counties shall be the si-'h districh; and there shall be appointed, for each of the said judicial districts, three persons of integrity and sound legal knowledge, residents of the state of Maryland, who shall previous to and during their acting as judges, reside in the district for which they shall respectively be appointed, one of whom shall be styled in the con.m'ssinn chief judge, and the ther two associate judges, of the district for which they shall be appointed; and the chief judge, together with the two associate judges, shall compose the county courts in each respective district; and each judge shall hold his commission during good behavier, removable for mistehavior on conviction in a court of law, or shall be removed by the governor, upon the address of the general assembly, provided that two thirds of all the menibers of each house concur in such address; and the county courts, so as sloresa dietablished, shall have, hold and exercise, in the several counties of this state, and and every the powers, authorities and jurisdictions, which the county courts of this state now have, use and exercise, and which shall be hereafter prescribed by law; and the said county courts established by this act shall respectively hold their sessions in the several counties at such times and places as the legislature shall direct and appoint, and the sai rice of the said judges shall not be din mished during the period of their continuance in

II. And be it enacted, That in any suit or action at law hereafter to be cormenced or instituted in any courty court of this state, the judges thereef, upor suggestion in writing by either of the pa ties therete, supported by affidavit cr other proper evidence, that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had in the county court of the county where such suit or action is depending, shall and may order and direct the record of their proceedings in such swit or schon to le transmitted to the judges of any county court within the district for trial, and the judges of such county court, to whom the said record shall be transmitted, shall near and determine the same in like the happiness to praclaim to the world that, in manner as if such suit or action had been originally instituted therein; provided, nevertheless, that such suggestion shall be made as aforesaid before it duri g the term in which the issue or sair s may be joined in the said suit or action: and provided also, that such further remedy may be provided by law, in the premises, as the legislature shall from time to time direct and enact.

III. And le it enacted, That if any party presented or indicited in any of the county courts of this flate, shall suggest in writing to the court in which fuch profesution is depending, that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had in such court, it shall and may be lawful for the said court to order and direct the record of their proceedings in the said prosecution to be transmitted to the judges of any adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of fuch adjoining county court thall hear and determine the same, in the same manner as if luch prosecution had been originally intlituted therein: provided that such further and other remedy may be provided by law in the premites as the legislature may direct

IV. And be it enacted. That if the attorney-general or the profecutor for the flate, shall suggest in writing to any county court, before whom an indichment is or may be depending, that the flate cannot have a fair and impartial trial in such court, it thall and may be lawful for the faid court, in their discretion, to order and direct the record of their proceedings in the said prosecurion to be transmitted to the judges of larged: I therefore respectfully hope the conany adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of such county-court shall hear and determine the same as if soch prosecu tion had been originally inslituted therein

V. And be it enacted, That there shall be a court of appeals, and the same shall be composed of the chief judges of the several judicial districts of the state, which said court of appeals shall hold, use and exercise, all and singular the powers, authorities and jurisdictions, beretofore held used and exercised by the court of appeals of this state, and also the appellate jurisdiction heretofore used and exercised by the general court; and the faid court of appeals hereby established, shall sit on the western and eastern shores for transacting and determining the business of the respeclive shores, at such times and places as the future legislature of this-state shall direct and appoint, and any three of the said judges of the court of appeals shall form a quorum to hear and decide in all cases pending in said court; and the judge who has given a decision in any case in the county court, shall withdraw from the bench upon the deciding of the same case before the court of appeals; and the judges of the court of appeals may appoint the clerks of said court for the western and eastern shores respectively, who shall hold their appointments during good beha vior, removeable only for misbehavior on conviction in a court of law; and in case of death, resignation, disqualification, or removal out of the flate, or from their refpestive shores, of either of the said clerks in the vacation of the said court, the governor, with the advice of the council, may appoint and commission a sie and proper perfen to fuch vacant office, to hold the fame until the next meeting of the faid court ; and all laws passed after this act shall take effect, shall be recorded in the office of the court of appeals of the western more.

VI. And be it enacted, That all and every part of the constitution and form of government which relates to the court of appeals and he general court, or the judgethereof, or that is in any manner repugnant to, or inconsistent with, the provisione of this ael, be and the same is hereby renealed, abrogated and annulled, upon the confirmation hereof; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed for as to authorife the removal of the clerks of the reforctive county courts being in commission at the time of the passing of this as, in any other mede or manner than that prescribed by the constitution and form of government.

VII. And be it enacted, That if this all finallihe confirmed by the general affembly 30f or the next election of delegates, in the fir" session after such new election, as the condition and form of government dito it, that in such case this all, and the a ter tions and amendments of the contlitestion and form of government therein rrained, shall be taken and confidered, and fall continue and be valid, as a part of the faid conflitution and form of government, to all intents and purposes, any thing in the faid constitution and form of government to the contrary, notwithstand-
