The editor, on this establishment, to whom is committed, the duty of alternate-ly touching the back of little *Shylock* with a *ticking rod*, or of scaring his posteriors with a *rod of scorpions*, is sometimes, in the evening, too far engaged, to notice in the next day's American, the clumsy paragraphs of the Gazette. Beside, our workmen generally finish their tasks, too early to admit of answering the Gazette, and having it put in type, without making night-work of it, and paying for it as *over-work*:—therefore, a *grace* of one day may sometimes be expected. Indeed, Brown writes in such *miserable*, often, such *unintelligible* style—so ungrammatical—so obscure—so badly arranged, that it sometimes would require the aid of inspiration to interpret his meaning—surely then, some reflection is necessary, to know what point, in his matter to begin at, to discover the solution, if any can be extracted!—But, to-morrow, perhaps, shall produce some *irradiations* on the subject.

Brown says, in a note, at the far end of his nonsense of yesterday, that our title, (as printers of the Laws of the Union) is neither earned, nor merited, "for though the laws were enacted 5 months ago, they have not published more than half of them yet." This is another piece of *Matthias's* common coin—we pronounce it a barefaced falsehood. All the laws have been published, except one, which has been accidentally omitted. We challenge young *Elwees* to prove to the contrary of this. If he does do it, as a compensation for the trouble of investigation, we will present him with the amount of the printing for the year! But as we wish not to hold forth *false* temptations we would give him the hint, that his old friend, the man *Timothy*, is not now the paymaster! The period of national speculation and extravagance is over! Instead of 700 dollars; a poor, paltry 80 dollars (never exceeds 90) is all the economy of the present order of things will yield!

We have branded the Gazette with being guilty of *falsehood*, in its representation respecting the laws—we know Brown will not institute the proposed scrutiny for the sake of—*character*—and why? because his character has too often been too *palpably* impeached, convicted, blasted and shattered by the American—it is therefore not worth protecting! But the money—ah, the money! that indeed, with young *Elwees*, may be an object!—at least, it may assuage the pains of *disappointment* for the *past*, and *anxiety* for the *future*! The handling of 3000 a week, in an active way, will be a vastly pleasant thing, but until this can be compassed, less sums will, no doubt, be acceptable!

Shylock's strictures, on our *explosion* of his views, are of such a nature, as to be scarcely worthy of notice, and were it not for several assertions, as *bold* as *false*, we might, out of mere charity, let them pass, as the infuriate effusions of the maniac's brain. He conceives, that as he is not acquainted with the beauty and harmony of arrangement in composition, it must consequently follow, that the editors of the American are equally ignorant! He seems to say, that our last production was so good, that it was not possible we could have wrote it! Indeed, if the source of praise was more respectable, and not so proverbially insignificant on the score of literature, it would certainly puff up our vanity, if we had any! And as Brown says, he should "be happy to learn, who the ingenious gentleman is,

that has taken up the quill so manfully," W. Pechin, an old acquaintance, presumes to take the liberty of presenting himself, with all due obsequiousness, to the august Mr. Brown, as the *favorite*, and much flattered penman! And as *Shylock* is fond of the *monish*, we offer him a reward of 1,000 dollars, in the face of the world, if he, or any individual, can discover any other author for the wonderful production, in question, on which he has so wonderfully lavished his praise—and we will aid him by free, offering every person employed on our establishment, as evidence in such *cause* of grand discovery!

Extract of a letter from a gentleman of the first respectability in Providence, dated 31st ult.

"There are no new cases of the yellow fever since last Saturday, and we are in hopes that every part of the town will be perfectly safe by the end of the present week.

"We attribute all this misfortune to the sloop *Friendship*, which arrived here some weeks since from a southern port, and has ever since been lying at the wharf. On the 19th inst. the attempt was made to clean her out, but she was found to be so excessively filthy as not only to make those on board violently sick, but the stench of the bilge water was so intolerable as to extend the effect to the neighbouring houses, and compel them to shut their doors and windows. On the 21st, some of their inhabitants began to complain; on the 22d, a physician, who had eight patients declared, that if he knew of an arrival from the W. Indies to that part of the town he should conclude it to be the yellow fever.

"The moment the complaint was known, the Town Council ordered the removal of all the inhabitants from the lower end of the town to Powers Lane, between the river, in the west side of the back street, which was punctually complied with, leaving only two families too much afflicted with the disease to bear it; these are now out of danger.

"Twenty persons have been taken down with the fever, of whom four have died, the rest are considered in a state of convalescence. The physicians pro-

nounce it less malignant than it has ever been before."

RUSSIA.

A new power is rising in the north of Europe, which is destined under auspicious circumstances to be the rival of England on the sea, and of France on the continent. This is Russia, which since the elevation of Peter the Great, has been making the most rapid advances in agriculture, trade, navigation, and acquisition of territory. She touches an extent of navigable water, superior to any maritime nation, in the old world, whilst she contains all the resources of ship-building, & the articles of traffic. To the north is the White Sea; to the west the ports in the Baltic; and to the south the Caspian, sea of Asoph and Black sea. In her present war upon Persia, she is acquiring the command and communication of the country between the Caspian and Black sea; and during the present war between England and France, she has obtained a landing in the Mediterranean itself, by occupying Corfu and the Ionian isles. Let the slightest controversy arise between herself and Turkey; and she can immediately discharge any army upon Albania or Morea. The Russian court has long aspired to the conquest of Turkey, and the command of the Black and Archipelago seas. It is well known that Constantine, the grandson of the celebrated Catharine, was educated by some Greek nurses, brought on purpose from the isle of Naxos. He was dressed in the Grecian style, and surrounded by the children of that nation, from whom he easily embued their language. "It was in regard to him," (says Toule) "that the Grecian Cadet Corp of 200 Cadets was established." The weakness of the Turkish government would render them an easy prey to such a powerful invader. Even the Turks are said by Witman in his travels, to have a prophecy among them, that their country is one day to fall into the hands of the Russians. The occupancy of Corfu meanwhile may satisfy the ambition and the purposes of Russia.

It is a subject of considerable speculation, whether Russia will ever consent to any treaty of peace, which does not recognize her right to this island, and whether in her turn she will not be willing to have Malta in the hands of the English. If we extend our researches still further, we may also enquire whether Russia is not desirous to restore the spirit of industry to trade on the shores of the Black, Archipelago and Levant seas; and whether her trade and navy are not destined to make her the most powerful nation in Europe.
