> > AN ACT

To provide for the trial of facts in the several counties of this state, and to alter, change and abolish, all such parts of t e constitution, and forms of government as relate to the general court and court of appeals.

DE it enacted by the general assembly of cassimer pantaletts, light cassimer coat, check- D Maryland, That this state shali be divided into six judicial districts in manner and form following, to wit: St. Mary's, Charles and Prince George's countres, shall be the first districh; Cacil, Kent, Queen Anne's and Talkot countier, shall be the second district; Calvert, Anne Arundel and Montgomery counties, shall be the third district; Caroline, Dorchester, Somerset and Worcester counties, shall be the fourth districk; Frederick, Washington and Allegany counties, shall be the fifth district; Baltimore and Harlord counties shall be the six'h district; and there shall be appointed, for each of the said judicial districte, three persons of integrity and sound legal knowledge, residents of the state of Maryland, who shall previous to and during their acting as judges, reside in the district for which they shall respectively be appointed, one of whom shall be styled in the commission chief judge, and the other two associate judger, of the district for which they shall be appointed; and the chief judge, together with the two associate judges, shall compose the county courts in each respective district; and each judge shall hold his commission during good behavior, removable for misbeliavior on conviction in a court of law, or shall be removed by the governor, upon the address of the general assembly, provided that two thirds of all the menibers of each house concur in sich address; and the county courts, so as afrees destablished, shall have, hold and exercise, atterations and amenda or or of the condiin the several counties of this state, all and every the powers, authorities and jurish clians, which the county courts of this state now have, use and exercise, and which shall be hereafter prescribed by law; and the said county courts established by this act shall respectively hold their sessions in the several counties at guch times and places as the legislature shall direct and appoint, and the salaries of the said judges sin II not be diminished during the period of their continuance in

Il And be it enacted, That in any suit or action at iaw hereafter to be commenced or instituted in any county court of this state, the judges thereof, upor suggestion in writing by either of the parties thereto, supported by affidevit or other proper evidence, that a fair and ignoartial trial carrot be had in the county court of the country where such suit oreaction is depending, shell and may greier and ducel the record of their proceedings in such suit or schien to be transmitted to the judger of any county court with a the district for trial, and the judges of auch county court, to whom the said record shall be transmitted, shall hear and determine the same in like manner as if such suit or aclien had been cinginally instituted therein; provirted, reverticless, that such auggestionshall be made as aftresaid before or duri q the term in which the issue or saues may 'm joined in the said suit or action: and provided also, that such further remedy may be provided by law, in the premises, as the legislature shall from time to time direct and enact.

111. And to it enucted, That if any party prefented or indicted in any of the counto courts of this tate, shall luggest in writing to the court in which fuch profecution is depending, that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had in such court, it shall and may be lawful for the faid court to order and direct the record of their proceedings in the faid profecution to be transmitted to the judges of any adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of such adjoining county court shall hear and detername the same, in the same manner as if tuch profecution had been originally intlituted therein: provided, that such further and other remedy may be provided by law in the premites as the legislature may direct and enach.

IV; And be it enacted, That if the attorney-general or the prosecutor for the state, shall suggest in writing to any county court, befere whom an indichment is or may be depending, that the flate cannot have a fair and impartial trial in such court, it thall and may be lawful for the faid court, in their discretion, to order and direct the record of their proceedings in the faid prosecution to be transmitted to the judges of any adjoining county court for trial, and the judges of luch county court thall hear and determine the same as if such prosecution had been originally inflituted therein
