There were also a parcel of post notes of the bank of Alexandria for 100 dollars, and for 50 dollars each. The remainder was in current notes, principally of the banks of Alexandria and Potomac, and some few of the bank of Virginia, of different sizes and denominations.

As the ATTACK was SUDDEN, and the WOUND received of a nature to deprive Mr. Peter instante of his senses, tho' it is now hoped he will recover, the description obtained may not be very accurate. As far as we are informed, the man who perpetrated the act is of middle stature good countenance, and had a ginteel appearance.
