LONDON, June 15. The arrangement of our western squadrons, by the direction of the present Admiralty, is as follows: -twenty-one sail of the line of Brest -Admiral Lord Gardner; five sail of the line off the coast of Ireland-Admiral Drury : seven sail of the line off Rochefort-Admiral Graves ; nine sail of the line off Ferrol-Ad--Admiral Collingwood. Total fifty-one sail of the line of the western fleet, all highly fitted, manned and equipped for any service. June 17.

The Ex-General Dubuc, and an officer of the name of Rossolin, have been taken up at Paris, as English spies-tried, condemned and shot. General Dubuc was formerly Ambassador from Tippoo Sultan to the French. He was afterwards the agent of the French Government with the Mahrattas. He was then taken at Pondicherry, and brought to England, from whence he was sent, with other French prisoners, from Pondicherry to Morlaix. The Moniteur gives a long account of the papers found upon them. The papers, says the Official Paper, prove, that the General had 100l. a month, and drafts upon Messrs. Hammersleys, and Thornton and Power, at Hamburgh, upon Paris. The object of this mission, and his associare Rossolm, is stated to be, to furnish the English with information, particularly with respect to the destination of the French squadrons ; to ascertain the number of partisans of the house of Bourbon, &c. &c.

A deputation has arrived at Milan from the Quéen of Etruria, in consequence of some as persions which had been thrown upon her character, for refusing to marry Prince Eu ene Beauhamois, the son of the Empress Josephine. -The mother, it seems, demanded in a letter, the hand of the Queen for her son. The answer was a polite refusal, on account of the youth of her young son the King, and a promise to her relatives, the Kings of Spain and Naples, never more to Marry. It is stated that Bonaparte has in consequence, demanded an interview with these princes. Eugene Beauhamois is a great favourite with his father-in-law, and will have a superior command in Italy.

Prussia has not yetacknowledged Bonaparte's title to the Crown of Italy, notwithstanding the assertion of the French Journalists to the contrary. In answer to the letter of Bonaparte, announcing his acceptance of the Crown, Prussia only thanked him for his communication, and for the assurances he was pleased to give of his moderation. The King added, that he was but remotely concerned in the affairs of Italy, and he hoped the Emperor would consult those powers more immediately interested, particularly Austria.—Bonaparte's new titles were neither given in the superscription nor in the course of the letter.

Sixteen sun vessels escaped from Havre on Wednesday last, and put into Fecump. They came out in open day, and fought the Chilicae, Falcon, and Cracker, which stood so close in shore after them, that the Falcon had four men wounded by their musketry. Four of them were driven on shore, but could not be destroyed.

### BOSTON, August 12.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

By the John Adams & Sally-Ann. from Liverpool, we have received our regular files of London papers to the 5th of July, from which we have been enabled to make very copious extracts. The leading articles of intelligence are those relating to the political affairs of the continent, which although opposed to the project of an united and vigorous prosecution of the war's against France, are, at the same time irentertained of peace, as the natural consequence of a failure of continental alliances. Great Britain can never be brought to make peace with France, while she continucs her present military establishment; and if obstac'es shall eventually oppose a a coalition of the northern powers, in a war which was entered into from no light, trivial or partial cause, England will continue to fight on, single handed; wisely preferring the sacrifice of her entire revenue, to the degradation of such a state of peace, as France would offer.
