COMMUNICATED.

The following extract of a letter from a gentl. man belonging to this city, who went from Leghorn to Milan, to be present at the late coronation of Bonaparte will shew the suspicious temper of that Robber of nations, and the insecurity which he has protected Americans have, of their liberty, whilst travelling through any country subject to his will.

MILAN, June 8, 1805.

"The night preceding the coronation we had retired to bed sooner than usual with the intention of rising early the next morning to witness the ceremonies of the day.—Soon after midnight, four officers of the French Gens D'Armes, with an officer of the Police, entered our chamber, and, after demanding our Carris de Senete, which were shown, informed us they were under the necessity of accompanying us to the Police.—Thus far we went cheerfully, without the least suspicion of what was after to befall us: Arrived at the Police, I was delivered over to one of the keepers, and conducted to a most loathsome prison, where I found for my companions nearly a dozen of vagabond wretches.—Amory's fate was somewhat similar, excepting his company being rather more select.—Two days following our arrest, we were re-conducted to our lodgings, our papers taken and sealed, and again returned to confinement. The fourth, fifth, and sixth days we underwent separate examinations, and as I had no papers whatever, that could, in the least implicate me, I was informed that I should be released on the following day. For several days after, however, I heard no further of our process, until I was again called and made acquainted with the intention of the French Commandant of Police, to send us both to Paris, to be delivered to the Po'ice there.—Through the interest of a friend this measure, as it respected me, was relinquished, and to him I am chiefly indebted for my liberation here.—Amory, very unfortunately, had in his possession a letter which treated freely on Bonaparte, and it was owing to this entirely, we were not liberated after the first examination of our papers. In consequence of having this letter, the Police have ordered him to be sent to Paris, for whence he set out this morning, under escort of an officer.—I am perfectly ignorant of the cause of our arrest—I, however, conjecture, with others, that it was on a suspicion of our being Englishmen, and as such denounced by some spy of the Police."

FROM CADIZ.

Captain Collier arrived here on Friday, in 40 days from Cadiz, corroborates the account published in our last of the arrival of Mr. Bowdoin at Coruna; and the capture of Gun-boat No. 3, and her immediate release on discovering her to be American. He also informs, that two days previous to his sailings, Gen. Moreau and family sailed for Philadelphia, in the ship New-York, capt. George. [Boston Gaz.

In addition to the numerous embarrassments experienced by our commerce in every part of the world, we have to add, that agreeably to a regulation adopted in Holland, the 18th June last, American vessels bound to Amsterdam are compelled to stop in the Texel Roads; and surrender all their papers, to be forwarded to Amsterdam by land, to be inspected by

the Dutch Commissioners of the Customs, and the French Commercial Commissary. The consequence is a delay from 10 to 14 days. [Ibid.]

On Friday last, GEORGE GABRIEL was convicted before Judge Bourne, on complaint of the Board of Health, of making and spreading false and groundless reports, by asserting that many persons have lately died of Yellow Fever, and been privately buried in the town of Boston, and also that the small pox raged in that town; with intent to excite the fears and alarm the public mind. [Ibid.]

In the account published in the TIMES of yesterday, relative to the wreck of the ship fallen in with by captain Lark, of the schooner Sally, a very material error occurred, which it is of course, hence immediately to correct.—It was stated that the letters cut upon the spar picked up were "Blanchin, G. R." but upon a close examination we find them to be "BLANCHI, M. G. R." The spar also appears to be about the size of the mizen royal yard of a frigate.

Capt. Lark further states, that he plainly distinguished the British ensign, but so entangled with the rigging, that he could not get at it.

A few days before captain Lark left Martinico, a Spanish and a French frigate sailed from Fort Royal, and two days after two French frigates, a sloop of war, and a cutter brig, also sailed. These vessels were left behind when the continental fleet sailed from Martinico.—The destination was not known, but supposed for Europe.

We think it not improbable, that one of the above squadrons have fallen in with and engaged a British king's ship, which has unfortunately been blown up in the action. This is rendered the more likely from the circumstance of her colors being hoisted at the time of the explosion—in this case, we hope a great part of her crew may have been saved. [Charleston Times.

FEMALE SOLDIER.—A curious circumstance occurred lately at Danforth's. One of the females, quartered in that town, was discovered to be a woman, after having been 18 months in the service. This discovery was made by the tailor, when he was trying on the new clothes. It is remarkable that she had concealed her sex so long, considering she always slept with a centinel, and sometimes with two. She went by the name of John Nicholson (her real name being Jean Clark) and, strange as it may appear, was esteemed a wag among the lasses. It is ever said, that she had caused a Lieut at Danforth's, to be plying in love with her; but who, since the discovery, is perfectly cured. [London paper.

The Philadelphia Board of Health have revoked their Proclamation of the 27th of July, which interdicted the communication between that city and Newhaven.

brig Charles, Portland, 13 days; Samson, do. 5; Apollo, do. for Martinique, 15; Decatur, Bath, 6; schooner Federal, Newburyport, for Turks Island, in 10; Eight Sisters, Higgings, Castine, 12; Minerva, Oakard, do. do; Betsy, Doshon, of Saco, sold; most part of the above to touch at the leeward islands.—Markets very dull, lumber 25 dollars, flour, superfine, 13; salt provisions very plenty and cheap, likewise all other American produce. Lat. 23, 35, long. 32, boarded by a French privateer, the captain of which took 2 hogheads water, 15 gallons rum and one dozen fowls—he was then from a cruise off Charleston, where she fell in with an American armed guineaman, and after a short action was beat off with the loss of 7 killed and 6 wounded. Passengers Mr. and Mrs. Eddy; Mr. and Mrs. Severy; Miss Martendell; Mrs. Thomas; Mrs. Rochfort, with 6 servants; and captain John Crumby, late of the sch'r Eliza, of Boston, which was captured by the Nimrod, vessel and cargo condemned, the captain turned ashore.

New-York, August 21.

Arrived since our last, The ship James, Campbell, from the Isle of France. This ship has been wind bound about two weeks at Hellgate—her ship news has been reported. She is a very fine vessel, pierced for 22 guns.

The brig Diana, Williams, in 71 days from Sabon. Left, the ship Dean, of Baltimore. In the Straits, spoke a Portuguese squadron of three 74's, enquiring for Algines. On the 30th of May, was boarded by a British privateer, the captain of which informed that the day before he had seen three Tripolitan Cruisers.

Brig Alexander and Sally, Swain, in 12 days from Newburyport.

The schooner William, Denison, of North Yarmouth, in 21 days from the City of St. Domingo. Left, schooner —, Hall, of Boston, to sail in 2 days, the only American there. All was tranquil at the City of St. Domingo; they were not apprehensive of any further trouble from the blacks. Captain Liddle, above mentioned, was master of the brig Volante; which vessel was lost on the 25th of May, on her passage from New York to Porto Rico. The William lost two men on the passage of dysentery, and 2 bill of fever and ague were handed at the quarantine ground.
