A violent quarrel having happened, which that nobleman was anxious to know the foundation of, that he might do justice to the injured party, he assembled all his household, and compelled them to take a solemn oath that they would represent the circumstances with fairness and impartiality; even his brother, the bishop of Luna, was called upon to make the sacred assertion: but when Petrarch appeared with an intent of following the bishop's example, the cardinal instantly closed the book, saying, "as to you, Petrarch, your word is sufficient."

Zenocrates, an Athenian philosopher, was so highly celebrated for his truth and veracity, that one day, when he approached the altar, to confirm by oath, the truth of what he had asserted, the judges unanimously declared his word was a sufficient evidence and would not suffer him to take the oath.


