From the (Nassau) Royal Gazette, re-
ceived at this Office.
NASSAU, September 6.
Arrived yesterday the armed brig
Alexandrine, John McKie, commander,
and schooner *Favourite*, William Cook-
ley, commander, from Cuba, with three
prizes—the schooner *Reyna*, Louisa, bound
from Paraco to Principe, laden with flour
and cocoa, captured in the entrance of
Neuvas, and the sch'rs San Jose las
Animas and one name unknown, cut out of
that port.
The above armed vessels went into the
port of Neuvas on the 22d ult. and from
the guns in the fort having been previous-
ly spiked & dismounted by capt. McKie,
no opposition was expected, but on run-
ning close in with the anchorage, they
were saluted by round and grape from an
18 pounder. The brig's boats were im-
mediately manned with 25 men, and rowed
on shore under repeated discharges
of grape shot, but luckily no harm was
done. On the boat's crew landing, the
Spaniards soon left the fort and retreated
to the houses, from whence they com-
menced a fire of musquetry: from these
lodgments they were likewise drove,
and an entire possession gained of the
fort, guard house, king's store house,
&c. the guns were again spiked up, and
that which was mounted on the battery
rolled down the precipice—some powder
was brought off and a large quantity of
shot and other warlike stores thrown into
the sea.
On the 25th ult. the *Favourite* gave
chase to a vessel to windward, which she
came up with very fast, but on the chase,
discovering a sail to windward (which
proved to be one of the prizes) she ran
on shore, & at drawing in with the beach
the prize schooner also grounded, when
the enemy commenced a very smart fire
from the *Reyna* and shore, which cut
the sails and rigging of the prize, and on
the boat's crew landing from the brig,
a skirmish ensued, in which three of
the enemy were killed. She proved
to be the Spanish schooner named *La Tasa*,
of 60 tons, laden with a very beautiful
and well equipped vessel, mounting one 4
pounder and four smaller guns, and man-
ned with 25 men from St. Jago de Cuba, had
been sent to Paraco for a port for the *Bahama*
Bank, and on her arrival at Neuvas infor-
mation was received from a private, to cruise
for a vessel from New Providence & Berry
Islands, and being able to get her off she
sailed for Neuvas.
On the 26th ult. the boat of the
AVON went into the channel of
Boa Caravela, in chase of a schooner,
but was suddenly drove back by a large
felucca, which lay concealed behind a
point of mangrove, mounting one 18 pound-
er and two smaller guns, and manned
with 10 men, commanded by one Mi-
guel; they chased an armed felucca, car-
rying one 18 pounder and 53 men, com-
manded by one Lorenzo, not long since a
licensed trader to this port.
On the 28th inst. the *Favourite* was
chased from Boa Neuvas, by one armed
brig, two schooners and one felucca.
Three of the enemy very soon gave over
chase, one schooner continued until they
got on the Bahama Bank, where, after
ten hours chase, in which the *Favourite*
threw two of her guns overboard, and the
enemy finding that she dropped astern,
shortened sail and gave about.
September 10.
His Majesty's ship *Stork*, Captain Le
Geyt, and her tender, commanded by Lieut.
Robinson, arrived here on Tuesday from
a cruise. She sailed from this port, the
4th ult. On the 23d day several sail-
—saw the tender in chase. They proved
to be American vessels bound from the
United States to the Havana. August
29, saw several sail, chased for action, and
exchanged private signals with his Ma-
jesty's brig *Suffolante*, having under con-
voy a number of vessels from the Bay of
Honduras. August 14, ran a schooner
and sloop ashore about 12 leagues from
the Havana; manned the yawl, and sent
her in; but being overpowered, were
obliged to retreat, with the loss of a very
valuable man, Robert Swan, sail-maker,
who was shot through the head. August
14, saw the Jamaica homeward bound
fleet, 150 sail, under convoy of his Ma-
jesty's ships *Vanguard*, *Papillon*, *Port*
Mahon, and *Perceps*; the two last men-
tioned returned after seeing the fleet to a
certain latitude.
We learn by the *Stork* and her tender,
that a short time since His Majesty's ship
Urquixo, captain Bouldersstone, of 16 guns,
fell in with a Spanish ship of 22 guns, full
of men, from Rio de la Plata, bound to
the Havana, loaded with beef in bulk,
hides, and tallow; the action lasted three
hours and a half; but the *Urquixo* having
been hulled several times from a fort, her
rigging much cut, and several of her guns
dismounted, the Spaniard made her es-
cape.
Since the action, we understand the *Ur-*
quixo fell in with and detain a brig un-
der American colours, carrying Spanish
property from Malaga to the Havana.—
We learn that the captain of the brig had
offered 50000 dollars for her ransom.—
The *Urquixo* has taken her to Jamaica.
BOSTON, September 23.
LATEST FROM FUHOPE.
By the arrival, on Saturday evening
last, of the ship *Neptune*, captain Sastry,
in 22 days from London, we have received
papers one day, and *London's Post*, three
days later than these received by the *Stork*,
from Liverpool.
From these dates we give a clear ac-
