BOSTON, October 2.

London papers to the 14th August four days later than before received; have reached us, by the arrivals from Great Britain. They are not prolific of news .- One article, however, which has its source in private communication, deserves some notice :- It says, that a treaty of alliance has actually been signed by the Ministers of Great Britain, Austria, Russia, Sweden, and the Ottoman Porte, in which it is stipulited that the Russian army in the Mediterranean, which is to be augmented to 80,000 men, is to be taken into the pay of Great Britain.-Thus says the article. However such, or a similar treaty, may be expected, we do not believe that the first information of its being signed would be received in London, in a private letter. We think it probable the British expedition, at Malta, under Craig, is destined to cooperate with the Russians in the south of Eu-

It appears by the lest accounts from Spain, that the Spanish Court expected the United States would so much resent their late conduct, as to declare war against them. This circumstance explains an article in the Madrid Cours Gazette, of June 22, which after noticing the ar rival at St. Andero, of Mr. Bowdein, our Minister, adds, "This circumstance has dissipated our apprehensions of an approaching supture between us and the United States !"

The Russians are continually augmenting their land and naval forces in the Meduciranean, and they have a strong navy in the Black Sea. The Russian authority is paramount inthe Republic of the Seven Isles.—The troops therein, it is said amount to 30,000; and aro daily reinforced. The Emperor of Russia has directed that thirty-six youths of the Republic, shall be educated in the European Universities,

at his expence. A letter from Mr. Williams, late American Consul, in London, dated July 12, 1805, says, "I have frequently cautioned my friends from sending cargoes, imported from the enemies colonies, to the countries of the enemics in Europe, in the same bottom."

NEW-YORK, October 4.

It is established, by intelligence from several sources, that nearly the whole naval force of France, Spain and Holland, is ready for sea; that every ship is crowded with troops; that a great number of inferior vessels, prepared for the conveyance of soldiers to a short distance. are lying at the French ports of the channel opposite England, in a condition to depart at short notice; and that the shores are thronged with troops marched thither for embarkation. These mature preparations must certainly strengthen expectations that the attempt to invade England or Ireland will be speedily made. Our Kuropean news reaches to the 20th of August; the grand neets were then so situated, that if their co-operation was relied upon, England could not have been attacked in that month. News of the first importance may be daily expected.
