FOR THE AMERICAN.

To the People of Maryland,

AN able, economical, impartial, uniform and steady administration of justice, is a vaiuable blessing to the society wherein it is established; under it, the poor are sheltered from the oppossions of the rich, the rich are secured in their property, and all are protected in their inestimable rights. But where the seat of justice is so exaited, as that the easy avenues to it, are prohibited except to the wealthy, and from the expence, inconvenience, and difficulties to be encountered, to obtain a participation in its benefits, even the moderately wealthy, when involved in its vortex, are threatened with ruin, and the poor are inevitably overwelmed, it becomes a grievance, and the society, that tolerates it, having the powerful means of ample and complete redicas within itself, merits the oppression. The general court has long been considered this grievance by almost every section of the state; an opportunity now presents itself, to be relieved from the burthen; it is with the people of Maryland, in the plenitude and majesty of their sovereignty to embrace or to reject it; and before they do reject it, it behoves them well to pender the consequences: for it will not be contembed, but that if the propose below is not adopted at the next session, the shackles of the general court will be rivetted for years. upon the state.

The contemplated system is not complex : its construction is phin, and from the simplicity of it, acquires strength: it contains provisions for the administration of justice, equally, speedily, imperially, substantially, and for expensively; for these just poses six great coerts are to be derected in the state, and one high appellate court, as the deriver resort; and it may be asserted, that justice will be administered, through the medium of these courts, when established, in the state of Maryland, as ably as in any state in the in ion, or in the courts of the United

But it is urged, that the state cannot supply competent characters sufficient to organise the system. And there may be a full confidence, that when the executive shall be called upon, to act upon this subject, they will be actuated, in their appointments, by no other motive, than the able organization of the courts.

Again it is agreed, that it will not be practicable to carry the system into opefor holding the appellate court, after allowing the county courts, in each district, two terms in each year, and three terms to Baltimore. This difficulty, which has been seriously started, and pressed upon the floor of the house of delegates, will easily vanish when examined. There are nine months in the year during parts of which, the county courts are at present fixed by law to be held, there are then three intire months, and very considerable fractions of other months, to be allowed for holding the appellate court, even should it be regulated by law, that it shall sit twice a year on each shore; for it is presumed that no term of the appellate court will continue longer than two weeks. Besides, as the county courts in one district, do not interfere with the county courts in another district, the same time, it requisite, may be fixed upon for holding the courts in counties of different districts, so as to give most ample time for holding the court of appeals, and thus every difficulty in this respect be entirely remov-

In case the proposed bill shall be confirmed, a bill containing detailed provisions, to meet the alteration made in the constitution, will have to be framed. The wisdom which will be selected by the people, at the ensuing elections, connected with that of the present senate, will be competent to this, and when framed, it will evidence, that there will be little difficulty in giving full and competent operation to the system.

It is not contemplated, by the proposed plan, to prostrate the courts of judicature in the state, and thereby disseminate disorder, confusion, and distrust. It is not for the purpose of disorganization, neither is it for the purpose of bringing the laws, of their guilt, and tyrannical behaviour toand the courts of justice into disgrace, that the alteration of the constitution has been intended. Were these mischievous purposes meditates, they could with more facility and more effectually be attained, by suffering the present establishment to continue, it has been long mouldring, and

Paine, from Marcinico, an account of his capture by a British sloop of war, off the back side of Long-Island, and the re-capture of the brigantine by captain Paine, who with his mate, rose on the vessel and brought her into the part of New-London, with the British prize matter and six men, put on board by the capters, a fact of which we had but an indifferent knowledge, but it raust have been well known to the editor of that payer. The presumption therefore is, that the editor of the Gazette considered the suppressing the account no mainer of injury to the Andorst deral cause, but that its publication, just at this time, might have some effect, some way or char, on the approaching elections. Queen Amis county can forbleast in Paine and his mate, who were left on board, and said brig ordered for Halifant; after she had been in possession of the captors several days, to the honor of captain Paine and Lie mat, they rose on said latig, although there were seven men again them, re-took and brought her safe into this part, without any blood being shed, to the joy of the owners and concerned. These fact, are well known by almost every person here, and were taken oif by the compiler of the marine list for publication in the Gazette. but for some reasons that I am up oppointed with, they have not been published; had it been a French instead of a British man of war, it would have been published in every federal paper on the continent, as was the case at the ship which was taken same time past off Charlestor, (S. C.) And what is more surprising, that instead of detaining the prize master and crew which captain Paine brought in here until our people should be returned from the Indian sloop of war, the friends of British depredations made upa purse for the prize master of about 50 dollars. If they were really in distress, I would feed and clothe even my en mies; but there are consuls and deputy consuls in every part of the United States, appointed by the British government, for the jurpose of taking

care and providing for their scamen. "I would ask the question. Suppose that any American captain and crew should be taken or cast away, and come into this port, whether the inhabitants would make up a purse for their relief, when it was known that there was provision made for them in New-York? I think nothing more would be done, than to supply their immediate necessities, which is the duty of every cirristian people to do.

"Connecticut federalists are more holy than any other christians, for assisting their enemies, though very apt to neglect their friends.
