Italy are estimated at 70,000.

Intelligence has reached England, that the whole of the French coast, from Morlaix to Bologne, is fined with troops for the arowed purpose of invading England; that the cannon, camp equipage, ammunition, &c. provided for the grand expedition, is beyond all example; and that the soldiers speak of the invasion in strains of rapture and enthusiasm. Some letters from the continent state, that the expedition was to have taken place early in August, but a squadron of men of war which was expected from Rochfort, or Brest [more probably the combined French and Spanish fleet] had not arrived, but was momently looked for. No doubts appeared to be entertained throughout the whole of the armed coast, which stretches from Brest to the Texel, but that the invasion of England would be attempted, and that too immedi-

It is said there are 25 ships of the line in Brest, ready for sea; nine at the Texel, with 200 transports, at single anchor; 7 at Rochefort, and 4 at L'Orient. With the number in the other ports of France, Spain, and Holland, we are not acquainted; but have reason to think there will be more than 30 new ships completed in the course of the ensuing winter.

All Officers in the Austrian service absent from their regiments were ordered to rejoin them on or before the 3d inst.

A new levy of 80,000 men has been ordered in the Russian States; and a corps of 40,000 is forming in Livonia, where it is supposed it will embrik. A squadron of eight sail of the line will leave Constract in the course of the present month, to cruize (according to some accounts) in the Baltic, but by others stated to be intended to join the British squadron in the North Seas.

Another division of the Russian troops from the Black Sca, to the amount of 20,000 men, was expected in the Adriatic during the last mouth.

Petersburgh Letters of the 24th ult. state, that all officers on leave of absence had been ordered immediately to join their respective Corps.

Prussia is busied in military preparations; and orders were lately issued for placing the medical staff on the war establishment.
