A CARD.

AN acquaintance and friend presents his respects to R. Stewart, and begs leave to express his regret at the contents of Mr. S's card yesterday. It was enough, that, by suffering himself to be nominated at the time so many offered for the republican suffrage, he contributed to divide and of course to disappoint it. Though he might have held his pretensions as good or better than others, yet. wheever was most actuated by a regard to public good, would have sacrificed his personal claims, even to those who were less wise, less furnished with legislative knowledge, if no doubt'of principle existed, rather than to bear a part in defeating the friends of equal liberty But the language of that card, not only speaks a determination to set himself up again without exception of circumstances; but it calls on the mechanics of Baltimore, to set up a separate interest from their fellow-citizens; to unite for that purpose in opposition to others and send a member to the legislature on their own behalf. Has any one class of citizens a right to such a privilege? are we not all involved in one interest? or has any body of men so narrow a view of a legislator's function as to think of sending a man with a mind confined to the interest of a part? A legislator acts for the state, not a trade or profession. Are we to go into a general contest of all professions against each other? or are the mechanics of the city to be ranged against all others? It is not believed that this is the intent or wish of our mechanics, and whoever would promote such a temper so unjust, and a claim so unreasonable, deserves to fall in the esteem of all. IMPORTANT COMMERCIAL IN-FORMATION.

Extract of a Communication from Land at, received at Boston by the Galen, dated August 17.

"Under the act of Geo. 3. 44. Chap. 80, the Merchants, supposed that neutral vessels might come from the enemy's possessions on the continent of America, or in the West Indies, to any port in England; but it is now found contrary to his Majesty's instructiona, that were given to his Majesty's cruizers; and those neutral vessels that shall be cleared out from those previous to the 1st Norembernext, will be allowed to come to this country direct. Vessels clearing at River Plate, Havanna, &c. after 1st November, cannot come to this country, or any port in Europe. American vessels from any other colony of the enemy, cannot now come to any fort in Europe.

" It is well to remind you, that American vessels cannot go from the enemy's countries in Europe with cargoes, or specie, directly or indirectly to their colonies: -that they act very imprudently who attempt to do it by touching at Lisbon, Madeira, or the United States, for fresh papers and clearances. That all your valuable expeditions to India, should originate in, and depart from the United States.

"It is not true that any recent orders ! have been given by the Admiralty, to detain American vessels loaded with sugar and coffee. The commanders of the cruizers act, no doubt, from the information they have received from their agents, as to vessels in the predicament of the Essex, Orne, and Enoch, Doane.


