**A MECHANIC.**

The New York board of Health report for Wednesday, 2 discharged cured—25 in the hospital—and 12 convalescents.

For Thursday—14 cases of malignant fever and 1 death—1 admitted in Bellevue Hospital—2 deaths—2 discharged cured—22 remaining in the hospital—15 of whom are convalescent.

The Board of Health of Philadelphia report for 48 hours ending on Thursday at 12 o'clock—3 cases of fever in Southwark—one in the city—1 admissions into the hospital—2 deaths—5 discharged cured—33 patients in the hospital—25 convalescent—and 7 adults and 4 children buried.

For Friday—5 new cases in Southwark—2 admitted into the City Hospital—1 death—5 discharged cured—and 27 remaining in the hospital—17 of whom are convalescent.

Extract of a letter from Coliz, dated August 13, 1895:

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF PHILADELPHIA.

"As a citizen of the United States and eye witness to the injury daily occurring to our commerce, I think it a duty to give notice thereof, in the hope that some vigorous measures may be adopted, to check these infamous proceedings.

"Every American vessel, bound up the Mediterranean, that is met with, is carried into Algiers, either by the gun vessels, or by the French and Spanish privateers, with which these seas swarm.—Many valuable vessels are already condemned; and the number of captures almost daily augmented.—Our Minister at Madrid, has already information of fourteen; and, unless some measures are adopted by our government, our commerce to the Mediterranean must cease.

"For the encouragement of privateers, the King has relinquished the duties on prize goods.

"Vessels destined to the Mediterranean, ought not to clear for a call at Gibraltar—for, although it is not declared to be blockaded, yet even letters for that place, found on board American vessels, furnish a pretence for bringing them in; when at best, they are obliged to abide a suit, or compromise, at great loss, with the captors."

**SHIP NEWS**

From the Merchants' Coffee-House Block October 12.

Arrived, schr Nonpariel, Bishop, 19 days from Port au Prince—Coffee, Thomas Tenant. Left there September 2nd, ship Neptune, Taylor; America, Jones, and Connecticut, Suter, of Philadelphia; schrs. Topaz, Kilburn, and Spy, Peary, of Baltimore; Julia-Ann, Alley, New-York. Sailed in co. with ships Satopson, Palmer, Leander, Cowper; schooners Diana, White, and Dash, Kerry, of New-York; Mowhawk, Quarles, and Eagle, Wills, of Norfolk; Forbes, and Friendship, Robinson, of Baltimore, (arrive 1.) Sept. 23, off the Hogues a small French privateer came up with the fleet, and fired several shots at the sternmost vessel, the Leander returned her fire, and by some accident her arm chest blew up, while capt. Cowper was standing on it, and burnt him from his feet to his waist very much, and wounded several others. October 4, parted company with the New-York fleet, in lat. 30, long. 74, 30.—Sept. 6, spoke brig Abby, Jaber, of New-Bedford, from Cape Good Hope, bound to Charleston, off 80 days—had lost his main-mast in a heavy gale, 2nd Sept. and otherwise damaged. Sept. 27, in sight of the Mole, spoke brig Nancy, Norton, from New-York for Jamaica, off 27 days; had been boarded the day before by a French privateer of Guadaloupe. When the Nonpariel left Port au Prince, it was confidently reported that Dessalines had treated with the British to give them possession of the Mole.

Also, schr. Friendship, Robinson, 19 days from Port au Prince—Coffee—John Wilnot. The schrs. Nonsuch, White; Eclipse, Meteor, hence have arrived at Jamaica. Brig Orion and schr. Amphion, at Gonaves; schr. Experiment at Cape Francois.

Also, schr. Brothers Return, Scott, 24 days from La Guayra—Cocoa and Hides—V. Lambay and W. Bowie. Left there schr. Emily, Stone, and Eliza Ann, of Norfolk, ready to sail with return cargoes; brig Leo, of Nantucket, not admitted; brig —, of Newburyport, admitted. Sailed in co. with schr. Hope, of New London. The brig Molly of Philadelphia, was cast away to the leeward of La Guayra, and totally lost—part of her cargo saved. The schrs. Chesapeake, and Baltimore, of Baltimore, had been at La Guayra, and not gaining admittance sailed for some other port.

The ship Maria, schrs. John and Aristides, of Philadelphia, and schr. Greyhound, of New-York, were at Cape Francois the beginning of September; schr. Admiral, of Philadelphia at Gonaves. The Conquest, Adden, of ditto at Port de Paix.

Left there 24th ult. ship Susannah, of Philadelphia just arrived; brig Wealthy Ann, Allen, of aid for New-York in 2 days; schooner Martha, Washington, do. do. schr. —, Darling, sailed in co. for New-York; the ship Portland, of Philadelphia from Baltimore for Norfolk, came into the Capes with the Eliza.—Flour 6 dolls.

Ship Horatio, Berryman, 44 days from the Bay of Honduras, bound to New York, in distress. On the 2d inst. in a heavy gale of wind sprung a leak, which occasioned the ship to make two feet water per hour, carried away the fore-yard and sprung the fore-mast. October 3, in lat. 36, 8, long. 74, spoke the brig Active, Black, of and from Alexandria, bound to Martinique—same day spoke the schooner Bevy, Blum, from the same port bound to Jamaica. At 6 P. M. same day, passed the wreck of the schooner Providence, of Alexandria—captain Black had boarded her and taken off some rigging, &c.—She was supposed to be from St. Domingo.

The schooner Henrietta, capt. Gilpin 18 days from Barbadoes, bound to Alexandria, put into Hampton Roads on Tuesday—Spoke, September 23, long. 20, lat. 62, 13, brig Arctique, of Philadelphia, bound to Santa Cruz, in distress, having lost his main and fore-top-mast—26th, in lat. 25, 37, long. 65, 33, fell in with a schooner bound upwards, having a pitch bottom—27th, in lat. 27, 18, long. 66, 39, saw a wreck to leeward, bore down to her, hoisted out our boat and went along side—found her to be a brig with both masts gone by the board, full of water, part of her fore-mast and bowsprit alongside, with 1 her fore-rigging—she was a small brig-broad yellow sides, and black bands, red inside her quarter boards, her quarter boards, her quarter deck painted lead color, with a wench. A few days previous to seeing these wrecks, fell in with a number of rough staves, pieces of scantling and barrels.
