DLANCHE FRIGATE. The action fought by la Blanche frigate, deserves to rank, for gallantry, as high in the public esteem as any other, however splendid, which has taken place during the war. It was impossible for Captain Mudge to resist, with any appearance of success, the vast superiority of the enemy in vessels, guns and men. His officers and his crew did not amount to more than 184 men fit for action, as of 215 on board, seventeen were boys, and fourteen were on the sick list.

For the following particulars of the engagement we are indebted to a letter from Mr. Hugh Honk, Surgeon of his Majesty's ship la Blanche, dated 7th August, on board the French frigate La Topaze, lat. 45, 19, long. 36, 45, W. "We were unlucky enough to fall in with a division of the enemy, in long. 65, 40, west, let. 20, 21, north, consisting of La Topaze, of 44 guns, Captain Jean Bapt. Beaudin, long eighteens and 20 pound carronades, Le Department des Landes, 22 long 9 pounders, La Toche, 18 long 12 pounders, La Fanne, 16 long 9 pounders, and one brig La Blanche's copper being in such a had state, and the superior sailing of the enemy, such as to leave us no chance, but what might result from the event of action. Capt. Mudge, his brave officers and crew, immediately determined to fight to the last extremity, and to sell their ship as dear as possible; nor was it until our rigging was nearly all out to pieces; eleven shot received in our fore-mast, several in the main mast, the spanker boom shot away, seven of our guns disabled, and above six feet water in the hold, our enemy on all sides in the act of boarding, that we had any thought of surrendering.

It was then, and not till then, that our cap- ; tain, by the advice of his officers, and from motives of humanity, consented to strike. The enemy found our ship so complete a wreck, that they immediately set fire to her. She went down with all her guns, stores, and ammunition, without an emplosion. We had but 215 men at the commencement of the action; our loss is, thank God, comparatively, small, being only Skilled and 15 wounded. There were 33 of our crew absent in detained vessels, and 8 more left on board the Diana at Jamaica. We had 17 boys included in the above, and 14 men on the sick list; so that, every thing considered, our enemy has very little to boast of.

> NEW-YORK, October 18. POSTSGRIPT.

The fast-sailing ship John Morgan, Captain Howard, arrived here yesterday in 39 days from Liverpool. Captain H. has favored the Editors of this Gazette with London papers to the Sd of September, four days later than those received by the Franklin, at Philadelphia; and Lloyd's Lists to the 50th August. The late hour at which these papers were received, prevents us from making more copious extracts-the following, however, appear to be the only articles of moment they contain:

London, September 2. Captain Blackwood, of the Euryalus frigate arrived this morning at the Admir.dty with dispatches.-His ship had been sent from Cork to ! Lord Melson; but mississ; him, proceeded to Admiral Coilingwood, off Cadiz The dispatch. es state, that the combined fleet consisting of 17 sail of the line, arrived at Cadiz on the 25th ult .- Admiral Colling wood, of course, did not, with his foorsail of the line, venture to oppose them-they chased him for a short time before they entired Cadiz. As soon, however, as they bad got in, he returned to his station, and reanchored off the harbour

On the 24th, the Euryalus fell in with Sir R. Calder's fieet, within 20 leagues of Cadiz, so that he would in all probability join Admiral Collingwood the next day, and the blockade of Cadiz would then be effectually resumed. Admural Bickerton is at Gibraltar with his six sail of the line, and the Carthagena fleet remain in port. Admiral Bickerton will be able to prevent their junction with the Combined fleets, should they attempt it.

Intelligence has been received with respect to the Rochefort squadron. They first went to Vigo to join the Combined fleets, but missing them there, sailed again.

Just or the Combined fleets sailed from Ferrol, eight large American ships, under convoy of two : smed ships, sailed from Nantz for Cadiz, laden with salt, beef, pork, and biscuit : the Colpoyabria Tell in with them in the night, captured two, the rest separated, and got between the Isle of Dieu and the Main.

We should ourselves be tempted to believe it, if we could imagine the Emperor of Austria to be so devoid of prudence as once mere to compromise the happiness of his people and his crown.

" Yet it is very true that the gold of England may mislead some of those who direct the cabinots of the Continent; but the history of the last campaigns, and the examples of our Emperor and King, ought to convince the sovereigns of Europe, that it is one of the most sacred of their duties to manage their aliairs themselves, instead of abandoning them to men who, in these extremely important questions, have no other mobile, than the passion of hatred, and the thirst of gold.

" The court of Vienna will act as it pleases: prace subsists-if Austria disturb it, if sice fire the first cannon, or if by these procedures, she obliges the Emperor of the French to fire it the first, do we think that war will end so soon 'and would the treaty which would this time be signed at Vienna be durable or not "
