I have therefore, in pursuance of the advice of the said Commissioners of Health, issued this PROCLAMATION—hereby prohibiting the entrance into the city of Baltimore, or within three miles thereof, of all persons whomsoever, as well as of all baggage or other goods, which have come from the said city of New York until they shall have been at least fifteen days therefrom excepting only the public mail and such persons or things, as the Commissioners of Health may admit by a special license in consequence of no circumstance appearing to them whereby the health of the city is endangered. And in addition to the prohibitions contained in a Proclamation issued by me, on the sixth day of September instant, interdicting the usual intercourse with the city of Philadelphia—the inhabitants of this city and the precincts thereof, are hereby expressly enjoined not to entertain, receive, or admit any person or persons into their houses who may have arrived here from either the city of Philadelphia or New York, unless he, she, or they, shall have previously obtained a special license as aforesaid.

This PROCLAMATION to remain in force until publicly revoked by me, of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly, under the penalty of Three Hundred Dollars for every offence, one half to the informer, and the other half for the use of the city.

**15 Hundred Dollars Reward.**  
YESTERDAY about 11 o'clock, in the forenoon, Mr. John Peter, an officer of the bank of Columbia, was stopped on horseback, on the road between this town and Alexandria, and within about two miles of the latter place, by some unknown villain, shot through the body with a pistol, and robbed of a sum of money, in his possession, belonging to this institution, which he was taking to Alexandria, for the purpose of exchanging with the Banks there.

The whole sum taken amounted to eighteen thousand one hundred and fourteen dollars and sixty five cents, made up in several packages, among which were

1 do. of the same for 500  
1 do. of the same for 450  
1 do. of the Bank of Potomac, No. 117, in favor of Jos. Kiddle, and by him endorsed in Washington Bowie, and by W. B. endorsed to Blank, dated 6th July, 1805, for 149 dollars, 65 cents.

A check of the Union Bank, on the bank of Alexandria, drawn by R. Higninton, cashier, in favor of G. C. Lam and Devereux, by them endorsed, and by Benjamin Stoddert, and C. Smith, taken.

There were also a parcel of post notes of the bank of Alexandria for 100 dollars, and for 50 dollars each. The remainder was in current notes, principally of the banks of Alexandria and Potomac, and some few of the bank of Virginia, of different sizes and denominations.

As the ATTACK was SUDDEN, and the WOUND received of a nature to deprive Mr. Peter instantly of his senses, the true name he will recover, the description obtained may not be very accurate. As far as we are informed, the man who perpetrated the act is of middle stature and countenance, and had a gravel appearance. He had on a dark blue or black coat, nankeen pantaloons, shoes, and a black hat. He was on foot and alone at the time, but may have had accomplices concealed, and will probably change his clothes.

Five Hundred Dollars will be given to any person or persons who will detect and bring to conviction the robber; and One Thousand Dollars additional for the recovery of the whole of the money, or in proportion for any smaller sum recovered. To all Bakers within the City of Baltimore, and all Ship-Ketchers that are concerned in selling bread, That we, a few bakers, have consulted one with another that it would be best to give public notice, that if they will not comply with the ordinance, that every loaf they sell must weigh four ounces, or twenty four ounces (or three pound, the ordinance permits no other size: Therefore we came to a resolution, that after this public notice, we will hire such persons as will go about to us to many shops and bakers as they can in a day, to try to enforce the ordinance, and buy up such light bread as bakers and shop-keepers sell. Such bakers and shop-keepers are ignorant of the extent of the fine that the ordinance points out, that every loaf that does not weigh a pound and a half or three pound, is ten cents a loaf fine, and every loaf that has not the baker's name in full on it is ten cents a loaf fine, and the person that buys such light loaves has it in his option to take out a warrant for every loaf, which amounts to six to six and a half cents a loaf, if the informer will be rigorous. If those baker's and shop-keepers that they cannot comply with the ordinance, because the ordinance is grievous to them, let them take the form and privilege of our republican government and draw up a petition to our honorable City Council, to have their grievances redressed; but their present proceedings are injurious to such as wish to comply with the ordinance, and injurious to private citizens, and taking advantage of the poor and ignorant, and themselves gain nothing by it; but is only calculated to give six or seven halves for twenty-five cents to avaricious shop-keepers that sell it at six cents a loaf.
