The legislature of Maryland at their last session passed an act for a turnpike road from Patterson & Stricker's Mill, westward of Benjamin Bowen's house to Richard Caton's limekiln, then prohibiting, as far as reason, justice, and respectful language could go, the extention of the said road in a direction to intersect the York turnpike in the following terms, to wit, "And whereas it would be unjust and improper to extend the said tumpike so as to make the same intersect the York-town turnpike, and by that means affect the interest of those persons who may become stockholders in the said York-town turnpike, by drawing off from said road any portion of the trade that now passes down the said foad into Old-town, in the City of Baltimore, and although this legislature is aware that the powers of all and every future legislature will be coequal and commensurate with their own, and that the acts of the present legislature may be repealed, changed and abolished by future legislatures if in their wisdom they may see proper so to do, yet this present legislature wishing to declare the grounds and principles upon which this law is passed, and to obviate any injury or injustice to me rights of such persons as may become proprietors of the said York-town turnpike, do for these reasons, most solemnly and explicitly declare, that the turnpike road hereby authorised and established, is granted upon the faith and condition, that the same shall not hereafter be further extended in a direction to intersect the said York-town turnpike, and thereby injure the rights of those persons who may be in any manner interested therein, &c" See the 22d clause of the law aforesaid, and notwithstanding which, I observe it announced that petitions will be presented to the next legislature for an act to remove the said road to the east of Benjamin Bowen's, and also to extend the same to the Pennsylvania line, in a direct route to Hanover. Surely, after reading the above express condisin and terms upon which the road was granted; it is reasonable to suppose that the

In short, we seem to have crept headfuremost into a long, dark, narrow, gloomy passage, where it appears impossible to turn.
