We are assured that the king of the Two Sicilies, on being solicited to take a part in the differences which exist between France and England, has renewed his former declaration that he will observe the most scrupulous neutrality. Several couriers passed through this city within these few days from Petresburgh for Naples, with all possible expedition.  
PETERSBURG, August 10.  
It is confirmed that our troops are taking a direction towards the provinces dependent on the house of Austria, and in particular towards Galicia, and that they are assembling in the environs of Troppau and Jajerndorf. They speak also of bodies of troops which will be embarked, and that they will be joined by a foreign force.  
NORFOLK, October 22.  
Mr. Dove, lately returned from our squadron in the Mediterranean, is appointed to the command of Gun Boat, No. 1. now at Charleston, in the room of lieutenant FANNING, deceased.  
Captain WILLIAMS, of the brig Ann Elizabeth, arrived here on Sunday, in 67 days from Malaga, has furnished the following account of the piratical treatment he received on his homeward passage :  
" October 1, in lat. 31. 11, long. 70, at 3 P. M. was brought to by an armed brig, mounting about 14 guns, and 30 or 40 men, a Guineaman, having 100 slaves on board, bound, as they said, from Barbadoes for America—the captain, who I took to be an Irishman, said his name was Cain, and the brig's the Speedwell, transport No. 9—his first officer he called Mr. Christopher, and another Crozier—his crew I think were all English—he sent his boat with Mr. C. and 4 armed men on board my vessel, who immediately took me on board the brig, where I was kept about two hours, while ten or twelve men who went on board my vessel were plundering her ; they broke open my trunks, robbed me of all my wearing apparel, not leaving as much as a shirt or pair of stockings ; they took also my hammock, sheets, watch, 200 dollars, a quarter cask of wine, seven baskets of cordials, some bottles of wine, porter and oil, one demijohn of brandy, part of a box of soap, and a variety of other small articles ; they also took all the mates clothes, and some Canary birds !—About 5 P. M. they put me on board, said my papers & vessel were clear, and told me I might proceed on my voyage—the wind being moderate we continued within a mile or two of each other until 7 or 8 o'clock, & being a clear moon-light night, they began to fire at me, when I have too—they came along side and hailed me in French, I told them I was the same brig that they boarded in the afternoon, which they, no doubt, very well knew—keeping me close within hail, they commenced black-jarding me, asking where I was from and where bound to, and every 10 or 20 minutes firing into my hull and rigging. I repeatedly told them who I was, and begged of them not to sink and murder us in cold blood—in this deplorable situation we were kept until midnight, when being within pistol shot under their lee, they hailed and told us to wear ship, immediately or they would sink us—I put up helm to wear, and as soon as our stern was fair to their broadside, they poured a whole broadside into us, loaded with round and grape shot, which hulled us, cut our rigging and sails in many places—at this time the moon was setting and it becoming dark and cloudy, made sail before the wind and got clear of them ; having stood E. S. E. the remainder of the night saw no more of them. They fired from 40 to 50 shot at us, and I have no doubt but they supposed they sunk us. We picked up off our decks a number of the grape shot fired at us.  
I suppose the above piratical brig to be about 180 or 200 tons burthen, British built, completely fitted for a Guineaman, and suspect bound to Charleston or Georgia—I think she is flush deck, and had a woman figure head, rather small for the size of the brig.

**Translated for the N. York Mercantile Advertiser.**

PARIS, September 1.  
The count de Cobentzel, ambassador from Austria, is expected here daily.  
They write from Madrid that the king has rendered public the receipt of Doct. Lafuente against the yellow fever : it consists of taking from eight to ten ounces of quinquina within the first 48 hours after the attack : the disorder loses all its malignity. The doctor has given a volume of cases attended by the public authorities.  
The immediate return of the Emperor to St. Cloud is announced, but it is not believed that he will remain long there.  
September 2.  
His excellency the minister of foreign affairs arrived at the imperial camp at Boulogne in the night between the 11th and 12th Fructidor, and on the morning of the 12th transacted business with the Emperor.  
That part of the imperial guard stationed at Paris has departed for Strasburgh ; the companies of chasseurs will march to-day, and the grenadiers to-morrow.  
His excellency marshal Massena is gone to Italy, to take the command of the French army.  
It is reported that a body of French troops has entered Naples.  
September 3.  
Yesterday, at two o'clock, an extraordinary sitting of the conservative senate was held under the presidency of the arch-chancellor of the empire.  
His majesty the emperor arrived at Malmaison this morning.  
September 4.  
It is generally believed that the Senate on Monday discussed the propriety of restoring the old calendar after the 1st of January next.  
September 5.  
The division under general Oudinot, 8000 granadiers, composing the advanced guard, passed by, forced forces, on the 2d instant through Cambray, and was followed by four other divisions of 9000 men each.  
By an imperial decree of the 9th Messidor, the island of Elba is re-united to the department of Corsica.  
The combined squadrons left Ferrol on the 10th Thermidor, and entered Cadiz on the 4th Fructidor. Admiral Collingwood, with four ships and a frigate entered the roads the same morning.  
On the 14th inst. (Sept. 1st) the first division of the armed body commanded by marshal Dauoust arrived at Lisle, and continued on the day following their march towards the Rhine. Three regiments of Hussars have also passed through that city on the same destination.  
BOULOGNE, Aug. 31.  
That part of the French army on the sea coast, which has departed for the Rhine, marched in columns, in the same order which is practised in the camps ; so that, when they arrived on the theatre of war, they will be found all formed and disposed for the operations of the campaign. A finer army was never seen, one more impatient for battle, or more animated with the presage of certain victory.  
STRASBURG, August 30.  
The new organization of the Austrian troops has been successfully effected. All the regiments of infantry will be composed of five battalions and one of grenadiers. The last will have 600, and each of the other battalions 900 men.  
According to the German papers the negotiations between France and Austria, continue without interruption. The same papers speak continually of the great movements making by the Russian troops in ci-divant Poland. They state as certain that an army is forming there ; but of its number, its object, or by whom it is to be commanded, they are uninformed.  
STRASBURG, September 1.  
They write from Ratisbon that the French Charge des Affaires, on the twenty-fifth of August, transmitted to the ministers and convoys resident in that city a note, the substance of which is, that the Emperor of the French has found it necessary to direct his attention to the movements of the troops, and the re-assembling the armies in Tyrol and on the frontiers of Italy ; that he wishes to preserve his confidence in the pacific sentiments of Austria, but that he cannot dispense with demanding an explanation of the movements which are in agitation ; that if this explanation should be unsatisfactory, a French army shall pass the Rhine, but that the princes and states of Germany may reckon upon the friendship of France, which has been manifested upon every occasion, and of which so many proofs have been given, &c.  
We are assured that the note by which these explanations have been demanded has been presented to the court of Vienna, whose answer we wait with the utmost anxiety. In the mean time we know generally that the Austrian army formed at Wells, near Lintz, in Upper Austria, has crossed the Inn, and taken military positions in Bavaria. We know also that the court of Munich has been officially informed of this measure.  
GENOA, August 24.  
We have received news from Toulon of the arrival in that port of the squadron under the orders of M. Jerome Bonaparte. His progress has been retarded by tempestuous weather.  
FLORENCE, August 17.  
An Austrian courier arrived here from Naples brings intelligence that the court had quitted the capital, and had retired to
