"Georgetown, October 29, 1855.

"I hope those in Baltimore, who mean to adventure in the Tontine, will make their subscriptions in November, and the earlier in that month, the more agreeable it will be. I want, if possible, to have the whole completed by the first of December, that I may have one month to employ in arranging every thing relating to this institution, in a way so clear, as to avoid the possibility, at least the probability, of alteration hereafter. You know that on the 31st of December every single share of stock must depend upon some life, which cannot afterwards be changed. I wish, indeed, by attention beforehand, to avoid every thing like the necessity of alteration or even explanation afterwards. **BOSTON, November 1.**  
FROM CALCUTTA.  
By the arrival of the ship Alexander, Hamilton, captain Leach, in 123 days from Calcutta, we have been favoured with papers to June 20th from, which we extract the following particulars.

May 29. His majesty's ship Culloden, bearing the flag of his Excellency Rear Admiral Sir Edward Pellew, commander in chief of his Majesty's squadron in the E. Indies, was at Madras, with the Lord Duncan, Cornwallis, Earl Howe, Concorde, and brig Harriet.  
Admiral Lincolns had resigned his command, and was about to return home.  
The papers are totally barren of any intelligence relative to the military transactions to the English in the East Indies.

**NEW YORK, November 6.**  
Captain Beresford of the Cambrian, having given permission for all impressed seamen on board his ship to write to their friends, letters are now brought up by the return of every boat which goes to that vessel with supplies. Capt. B. having declared that he has no wish to detain a single American, and wish as soon as their citizenship is proved, deliver them up.

Extract of a letter received in New York, by the ship Osage, from Havana.

The following vessels have been sent in here for adjudication:—  
"Brig Jason, Palmer, of Philadelphia, from Liverpool for New Orleans, taken by the Spanish privateer Buena Union, captain Ulariago, and carried into Cavanus. This vessel was detained upwards of three months, the principal part of the cargo plundered.  
"Brig Argo, Lilly, of Dresden, from Jamaica to New York, with rum, captured by the Spanish privateer Flor de Mays, Lissard, carried into the west end of Cuba and libelled.  
"Schooner Nelson, Thompson, of Newbern, (N. C.) from Jamaica for Charleston, with rum, and \$15000 cash, taken by the Spanish privateer Vengeance, Antonio Rio, master, sent into Mariel & plundered of his money; vessel and cargo libelled.  
"Schr. Letitia, Franklin, of and from Philadelphia, for New Orleans, taken by the privateer Vengeance and sent into Havana.  
"The brig Sally, Barry, arrived at Havana the day captain Sammis sailed, last from Lagaira, had been plundered off the west end of Cuba by two privateers, one under French and the other under Spanish colours.

The abuses on the commerce of the United States in this quarter, are increasing from the increased number of privateers, and the idea they have that in consequence of the variance which they suppose exists between the government of the U. States and the court of Spain, they will be justified in making captures.  
"Certificates of property are a necessary requisite to every bill of lading, and sealed vessels are viewed with great suspicion by the court of admiralty in this island.  
"The treaty between the United States and Spain is not taken into consideration, except in cases when it will militate against the captured. The laws are such as to occasion great detention and delay in prize causes, and the disposition of the government, and the judge of Admiralty is such, and the intrigues in every department are so frequent and intricate, that an American stands a poor chance for justice; and if he eventually obtains the liberation of his vessel, when he comes to take possession of her he finds her plundered, the necessary consequences of delay, which is too frequently caused for the express purpose of giving the privateers an opportunity of doing it.

From the long habit they have in this island, of depredating upon American commerce with impunity, they absolutely consider it free plunder, and unless some measures are taken by the government adequate to the evil, which are to make the people of this island feel the misery they would be exposed to without our commerce, we expect their abuses will increase rather than diminish.
