Georgetown, October 29, 1855.
"I hope those in Baltimore, who mean to
venture in the Tontine, will make their sub-
scriptions in November, and the earlier in that
month, the more agreeable it will be. I want,
if possible, to have the whole completed by the
first of December, that I may have one month
to employ in arranging every thing relating to
this institution, in a way, so clear, as to avoid
the possibility, at least the probability, of alter-
cation hereafter. You know that on the 31st of
December every single share of stock must de-
pend upon some life, which cannot afterwards
be changed. I wish, indeed, by attention be-
forehand, to avoid every thing like the necessity
