Admiral Pocock's celebrated pickle for

In 4 gallons of water add 1-2 lb. brown sugar, 2 oz. Salt Petre, 6 lb. large or Bay Salt: Boil all these together in an iron pot or kettle, and skim it repeatedly as long as any scum rises; then take off the pot and let it stand till the liquor is cold. The meatheing placed in the vessel meant to hold it, pour the cold pickle on it till it is covered, and put something on to keep it in the pickle, and thus keep it for family use. When it is intended to keep it for a length of time, the pickle must be boiled once in 6 weeks or two months at farthest, adding, during the boiling 2 oz. sugar, and half a pound of salt, scumming as before directed. By this management the pickle will keep good 12 months, and is always ready for a fresh supply of meat.

N. B. The foregoing method is equalexcellent for Bacon and Beef.
