Private correspondence.

Paris, September 15, 1805.

The minister has recommenced drawing bills to satisfy the claims of the American merchants on this government.

Extract of a letter from the captain of an American ship to his owners in this city, dated

Miragouane, (Hispaniola) Sept. 14, 1805. I am at this moment at Miragouane, and but a very few days released from a state of anxiety. There has been a great disturbance here with the mountain negroes; they have risen in arms against this town; a short action took place here on the 28th of August, in which some fell on both sides; and the place is still in a confused state.

WASHINGTON Nov. 19.

On Monday arrived in this city, our gallant and distinguished countryman, GENERAL EATON, in good health. His achievements merit, and we entertain no doubt will receive, the respectful attentions of his fellow citizens in every part of the union.

The following letters, the contents of which are derived from a correct source, exhibit, in lively colors, the deplorable state of the Algerine nation. Although we have so lately experienced the effects of their barbarous injustice, we cannot avoid commiserating the abject and dreadful condition of a nation enslaved by despotism to the lowest pitch of misery.

Extract of a letter from Algiers, dated July 27, 1805.

In my last I mentioned the murder of the great Jew Buzza by a French soldier in this city the 28th ult. and the next day the soldiers rose in a body and killed every Jew they met with and plundered their houses. From that time to this the city has been in a perfect state of rebellion—the soldiers setting the Day and all authority at defiance. To add to this state of wretchedness, the wretched country of Moris, (from Francesen to Constantine) have risen up in arms, and the Turks, being determined to shake off their yoke.

The city of Francesen has long since been taken by the Moorish army, and accounts state that Oran cannot hold out much longer, being out of provisions, and deprived of the necessary supply of water. Every vessel that goes there the Dey detains, to be ready to take off the Turks when they can hold out no longer.

The city of Algiers has given Oran a partial relief at times with grain; but can do no more for the present, as the want of that article here is the source of the greatest troubles. Nothing of the provision kind can be had from the neighborhood of the city of Algiers, as the Moors are all in arms waiting the force of Oran; after which, it is beyond doubt, they will turn their whole force to this place; therefore all the grain that can be found near the city is conveyed in by the orders of the Dey.—The Turkish soldiers to a man left their barracks the 25th inst. and marched out of town contrary to the orders of the Dey, where they held a secret conference of 3 hours and then returned to town again.

On the 27th inst. the soldiers as before held another conference—the result is unknown—but the Dey, Divan, &c. are in the greatest alarm for their own safety, and are constantly in session in the palace.

'Tis conjectured the soldiery intend to destroy the Dey in consequence of the Dey having strangled two principal Turkish soldiers, for outrages committed on the Jews, and create a new set of Rulers. The conduct of the Dey, &c. establishes this idea in the strongest point of view, as they have taken great care of themselves by doubling the palace guards, &c. and closing all the streets gates at sunset—these are never shut but in times of real danger.—The city gates are always shut at dark; but these precautions will not answer the end intended.—Destruction is on the wing. Thus, sir, you may see what Algiers is at present—beset within and without by her own subjects, it is supposed a short time will bring to pass such a scene of horror as is unknown even in history.

Extract of a letter from Gibraltar, dated September, 9, 1805.

By our accounts from Alicante. I find that six new Deys were successively massacred at Algiers, also the Jews Bacarry and Bossinac, their families, and other principal Jews. They wanted to proclaim the Mical Hodge as a seventh Dey, but he made his escape and got to Alicante!

(BY DESIRE.) AN ORDINANCE For the admission and regulation of Brokers.

I. Be it enacted and ordained by the mayor and city council of Baltimore, That from and after the first day of April next, no person shall exercise the employment of a broker within the city of Baltimore, in making bargains between merchant and merchant, or other persons concerning merchandise, insurance, or any other matter or thing whatsoever, until he shall have previously obtained from the mayor, a licence of admission under the seal of the corporation.

II. And be it enacted and ordained, That upon the admission of any broker, he shall take an oath or affirmation, as the case may be, to the effect following:—viz. I, A. B. do solemnly promise and swear, (or affirm,) that I will truly, honestly and faithfully, execute and perform the office and employment of a broker, between party and party, in all things appertaining to the duty of the said office and employment, without fraud or collusion, and to the best of my skill and knowledge.

III. And be it enacted and ordained, That no person shall be admitted to be a broker, as aforesaid, until he shall with good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the mayor, enter into a bond to the mayor and city council of Baltimore, in the penal sum of fifteen thousand dollars, conditioned to the effect following:—viz.

The condition of this obligation is such, that if the said A. B. do, and shall, well and truly, execute and perform the office and employment of a broker, between party and party without fraud, collusion, imposition, or any corrupt or crafty device, and do and shall faithfully execute every trust committed to him as broker, then this obligation is to be void, otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

IV. And be it enacted and ordained, That the licence of admission aforesaid shall have continuance only for the term of one year from the date hereof, and every broker desirous of renewing his licence shall apply for the same to the mayor each and every year.

V. And be it enacted and ordained, That if any person not being admit of as a broker, shall act as broker within the city of Baltimore, he shall forfeit one hundred dollars for each and every offence, to be recovered by action of debt on a promissory note for the use of the corporation, and in any person shall knowingly employ any person as a broker, not being admitted as a broker, he shall forfeit one hundred dollars for each and every offence, to be recovered by a promissory note as aforesaid.

VI. And be it enacted and ordained, That every person obtaining a licence of admission as a broker, shall for each and every licence, pay to the mayor, for the use of the corporation, the sum of fifty dollars.

VII. And be it enacted and ordained, That if any person who shall sustain any injury or damage from any act or default of a broker, contrary to the tenor of his obligation given as aforesaid, then and in such case, such person may institute an action in Baltimore county court, for his use and benefit, in the name of the mayor and city council of Baltimore, upon the obligation given as aforesaid by such broker; and in such action he shall recover judgment for the amount of damages sustained by him; and in all such actions the same principles of law, the same proceedings shall prevail, as do obtain in actions prosecuted by individuals, upon bonds given by public officers to the state of Maryland, with collateral conditions.

Approved, Feb. 28th, 1798.

An uncommon action of a Dog.

It seems a servant had formed the design of assassinating his master and robbing the house; but the night he had fixed on, the dog, which had never been much noticed by sir Henry, for the first time followed him up stairs, got under his bed, and could not be got from thence by either master or man; in the dead of the night the same servant entered the room to execute his horrid design; but was instantly seized by the dog, & being secured, confessed his intentions. There are ten quaint lines in one corner of the picture which concludes thus: Put in my dog, whereof I made no store, I find more love than those I trusted more.
