COMMERCIAL CORRESPONDENCE. Prices and remarks on the Liverpool market, Schlember 14, 1895, communicated in a letter to a respectable merchant of

Boston. " Webelieve the harvest in this kingdom is not more than built completed; the weather since our Price Current has not been favorable, but there is no alteration in prices. We conceive if the weather does not materially improve, that there will be some advance, and if it should prove favorable during the remainder of the harvest, it seems generally believed, that there will not be much, if any reduction in the prices of Grain and Flour. At present the demand is dull, prime American Wheat may be quoted at 13s. a 13s6 per 7elbs, and superfine l'iour at

#3sa5lsp.rbarrel. "Upland and New Orieans Cotton continue in brisk demand, and it seems not not improbable that there will be some further advances before the new crop begins to arrive, and as usu d. some depression may take place after the commencement of the next year; but on the extent of this, much will depend on the prospect there is regarding the supply from the new crop. There is very little demand for fine cottons, and it is the opinion of those who seem best informed on the subject, that they will continue in a dull state for some little time longer; the purchasers decline coming into the market until the Demerara fieet arrives, which is soon expected; when this fleet comes in, and if the quantity of cotton which it brings should not prove large, we think the demand will improve for the finer descriptions of cetton.

" We expect both Pot and Pearl Ashes will materially decline in prices, as sufficient supplies seem to be coming forward, if this takes place, we should not be surprised to see a considerable reduction.

" Rice is likely to continue a dull article, as the quality is so very inferior this

" Our market scema sufficiently stocked with Quereitron Bark, it at present meets a dull sale, but it is expected there will be a greater call for it in the course of a few months.

" We c-loulate that there are about 700 barrels of Turpentine held on speculation, which were purchased about six months ago at from 15 a 16s per curt. What comes in is sufficient to supply the consumption, and we see no prospect of this article encreasing in price. Tar is not likely to be lower than 18s per bbl.

"The prices of Tobacco are pretty, steady.

"We expect a quarantine will be laid on all vessels, as usual, coming from a port where any epidemical fever rages, and perhaps it may be lold on some vessels without a just cause. When therefore you ship any goods in any vessel, it will be desirable, ispracticable, to send a clean Bill of Health with her, and likewise the British Consul's Certificate that the city is in a perfect healthy state, and that no fever rages. "" The war which appears likely to take

place on the Continent, does not seem likely to produce any unfavorable effect upon our trade; and it is the opinion of many, that our trade there will now be conducted with more facility than it has been for some time past.


