In addition to the Bulletin which we gave yesterday, respecting his Majesty's ship Calcutta and her convoy, we have now to communicate the following extract of the log book of the African South Whaler, transmitted to the Admiralty:

"Thursday, the 26th Sept. lat. 49, 20, N. long. 8, 40, W. the Calcutta made a signal for a strange fleet, and in the course of the day another for the enemy, and for the convoy to disperse. Observed a ship of the line and four frigates, with about twenty sail of merchant ships, supposed to be West-Indiamer, which they had captured. Two French frigates in chase of the African, coming up fast; hauled to the windward.

" Friday, 27th-French frigates still in chase; at about 4 P. M. saw one of the enemy open her fire upon the Calcutta. Which was returned from the stern chase guns of the latter. Apprehend that the whole convoy, except curselves, fell into the enemy' hands. At sun set heard the report of many guns, and observed flashes i the W.S. W.

Upon this interesting subject no official accounts have yet reached the admiralty; but it is ascertained, by dispatches brought from Admiral Cornwallis, by the Adrian_cutter, lieut. Forbe, that on Friday se'nnight, a squadron had been sent fromthe Channel fleet in quest of the enemy. The morning of that day Rear Admiral Stirling, with five of the line rejoined Admiral Cornwallis, after an unsuccessfell cruize in pursuit of the Rochefort squadron, which was known to have been out a month. Such has been the anxiety, of Admiral Cornwallis for the security of our trade, that when the Adrian left the fleet he had not a single frigate with him, having dispatched them all on the look out for the enemy.
