FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 7.
Arrived, the brig Lydia, Wednesday from Bordeaux—Left there, the 25th of October, the ship Thomas, L. Jones, of this port, discharging. Spoke the ship Fabius, Norris, from this port, going up the Garonne.

Capt. Webb is the bearer of Bordeaux papers of October 25, and Paris of 18th, by which it appears, that the French had gained very considerable advantages in the neighbourhood of Ulm, over the Austrians.

We stop the press to say, that we have received the "JOURNAL DE COMMERCE," of the eighteenth of October, which contains a letter from the Emperor Napoleon to the Prefect and Mayor of Paris, under date from the Imperial head quarters at Augsburg, of the 11th October stating, in substance, that a battle had taken place at Wertingen, between several divisions of the French army, commanded by Prince Murat, and twelve battalions of Austrian grenadiers, the Elite of their army, in which the Austrians had been defeated, with the loss of all their artillery, eight stand of colors, many officers and soldiers killed and wounded, and 4000 made prisoners.

Another letter of the same date, states that a second action had taken place within 24 hours, at Gunzburg, in which the French were again successful.

In this action, the Austrians are stated to have lost 2500 men, killed and wounded, 1200 prisoners, among them Maj. Gen. Aspre, and 6 pieces of cannon.—The French lost 400 killed and wounded.

Several Austrian Magazines, among them those of Fridberg, in Bavaria, had fallen into the hands of the French.

The communications of the Austrian troops are said to have been cut off at Augsburg and Landsberg.

Prince Murat, with the corps of Marshals Ney and Lannes, were in pursuit of them.

Ten regiments had been withdrawn from the Austrian army in Italy, and had arrived by Post, at the Tyrol.

Some Russian corps, which were also transported in carriages, were advancing towards the Inn.—But the French state their positions to be so advantageous, that they should be able to maintain them.

PARIS, October 18.

Second Bulletin of the Grand Army.

From the *Moniteur*.

The events succeed each other with the greatest rapidity. On the 14th the second division of the body of the army of Marshal Soult, commanded by general Vandamme, forced its march, halted at Nordingen only two hours, arrived at 3 o'clock in the evening at Donawerth, and took possession of the bridge defended by the regiment of Coloredo. There were some men killed and others taken prisoners.

The 15th at day-break, Prince Murat arrived with his dragoons; the Bridge was that very hour repaired, and Prince Murat, with the division commanded by General Watter, marched towards the Lech, made Colonel Watter cross it at the head of 200 dragoons of the 4th regiment, who, after a very brilliant charge, took possession of the bridge of Lech, & routed the enemy, who was double his force. The same day Prince Murat lay at Rain.

The 16th Marshal Soult set off with two divisions Vandamme and Legrand to march towards Augsburg, at the same time that general St. Hilaire, with his division, marched towards that town along the left bank.

The 16th at day-break, Prince Murat, at the head of the divisions of dragoons, of Generals Beaumont and Klein, and of the divisions of carabiniers & cuirassiers commanded by General Nansouty, marched to cut off the road from Ulm to Augsburg. On arriving at Wertingen, he perceived a considerable division of the enemy's infantry, supported by four squadrons of the cuirassiers of Albert. He directly surrounded this whole body. Marshal Lannes, who was marching behind these divisions of cavalry, arrived with the division of Oudinot, and after an engagement of two hours, colors, cannons, baggage, officers, and soldiers, the whole division of the enemy was taken. There were twelve battalions of grenadiers, who were coming in great haste from the Tyrol to the assistance of the army of Bavaria. We shall not know before to-morrow all the details of this truly brilliant action.

Marshal Soult, with his divisions, manœuvred the whole day of the 15th and 16th on the left bank of the Danube, to intercept the outlets of Ulm, and observe the army, which appears to be still united in that place.

The corps of Marshal Davoust did not arrive before the 16th at Nembourg.

The corps of general Marmont also arrived here.

The corps of general Bernadotte and the Bavarians arrived on the 10th at Aichstett.

From the information receive, it appears that twelve Austrian regiments have quitted Italy to reinforce the army of Bavaria.

The official relation of these marches and of these events will interest the public, and will do the highest honor to the army.

Jamaica Trade.—We have been favored (says the Boston Palladium) with a communication by the Governor of Jamaica, dated on the 17th day of October, for extending to the 30th of June, 1806, the permission given for the importation, in neutral vessels, of sheep, hogs, poultry, small live stock of all kinds, fruit, and all sorts of fish, flour, corn, meal, bread, rice, peas, beans, and lumber of every description, and the exportation of rum and molasses. Any persons attempting to introduce other articles than those enumerated will have their vessels seized.

A large proportion of the clergy of the city of New York, by and with the approbation of the Common Council, have resolved to set apart Wednesday the 18th inst. as a day of humiliation, thanksgiving, and prayer, on account of the late dispensations of Divine Providence towards that city; and the Common Council have recommended to their fellow citizens to abstain from all manner of business on that day.

A day of General Thanksgiving, for the signal favour bestowed by the Author of All Good, on the citizens of Charleston, in blessing them with health and prosperity through the late season, while other cities on the continent have been scourged with pestilential diseases—was voted by the Common Council: and Friday the 22nd ult. set apart for that purpose.

THEATRIC.

A benefit for the Orphan Children of the late Mr. John Hodgkinson, is advertised for Monday last by the Company of Comedians at New York. This performance will consist of the Voice of Nature and the Children of the Wood. The celebrated FENNEL has volunteered his talents for the Orphans, in the character of Rinaldo in the play, an important and difficult character.

James Shaw, Esq. who formerly resided in New York, was elected Lord Mayor of London on the 28th of last September. He is a native of Scotland, and of the House of Douglass and Shaw—of London.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Madeira, to the editor of the New-York Mercantile Advertiser, dated September 24th.

"The English frigate Leda anchored here yesterday, having left the East India convoy of 60 sail 5 days since on their way to this place, where they are to stop to procure wine and water. This fleet has ten thousand troops on board, with a great proportion of officers, on some secret expedition. The Reasonable, a 54 gun ship, now here, having received orders to join them for the Cape of Good Hope, it is supposed by some that the object of this expedition is that place. The ship Thomas Gordon, has just dropped anchor; but owing to the death of a Portuguese passenger on board, no communication from shore is yet allowed; but I presume there will be in a few hours. The vessels now in the road of Funchal are ships Numa, Waterman, of New-York, discharging; Thomas Gordon, do. just arrived; brigs Union, Selby, and Saunders, Singleton, both from Philadelphia, dis-

charging; Minerva, Richards, of New-York, sold; Hathaway, of N. Bedford, bound to St. Michaels, London, and Russia; schooner Federal Republican, of Boston, and an English West India fleet of 55 sail, under convoy of the Dorchester, of 44 guns, Dart sloop of war, and a 50 gun ship. The East India convoy of sixty sail is hourly expected."

The *Moniteur* of the 18th Sept. contains the following article:

Madrid, August 15, 1805.
"The Prince of Peace having informed the king that the English merchants are in the habit of sending their goods to Cadiz in neutral vessels, under pretence of their being the merchandize of neutral nations, his majesty has ordered by a decree of the 1st of this month, that, in order to put an end to this abuse, the ordinances which prohibit the entrance of English merchandize into Spain, shall for the future be executed with the utmost rigor. M. Cevallos, our prime minister, has been appointed to the direction of the war department, which he has hitherto administered only *ad interim*. On the 4th of this month they arrived at the camp of Buena Vista, near St. Roch, two battalions of the Spanish & Walloon guards."

Twenty-seventh Regiment.

The citizens enrolled in this regiment will please to hold themselves in readiness to form alternate patrols, for the protection of the district—to commence duty at 6 o'clock in the afternoon of the 11th instant.

This duty so particularly incumbent on our citizens at present, will commence with the 1st company of the 1st battalion, who will furnish a patrol of 30 men, exclusive of officers, to do duty on the night of the 11th, and an equal number the night of the 12th. The 2d company of the same battalion commences duty the night of the 13th, and so on in succession. The 1st company of the 2d battalion are to be ready the night of the 19th, and so on alternately. The patrols are to protect Hanover-street and the intermediate space between that street and South-street, to the precincts; and the majors of each battalion will issue the necessary orders in succession—Officers commanding patrols are particularly requested to guard against any irregularity in their several commands.

New-York, December 6.

Arrived since our last.
The ship Numa, Waterman, in 54 days from Funchal, Madeira. Left at Madeira, the ship Thomas Gordon, to sail in 8 days for New York; and the brig Blossom, of Portsmouth, to sail soon for London. The English East and West-India convoys, with eight 54 and 74 gun ships, 3 frigates 2 cutter brigs, and a number of transports sailed the 3d Oct. in great haste, with 12,000 chosen troops on board, under the command of Sir Home Popham and General Baird, on a secret expedition, supposed for the Cape of Good Hope, the Spanish Colonies in America, or some other very important object. An African convoy arrived the day the Numa sailed; also, the American brig Exchange, Orne, from Bordeaux, and sailed again for a port in the United States; and the same day, a Danish frigate bound for the St. Thomas station. Spoke Oct. 27, the Danish brig Good Hannals, from Norway for St. Thomas—they informed that a war was daily expected to take place between Russia and Denmark. Nov. 27, in lat. 34, 10, long. 95, the ships Julius Caesar, Hall, 56 days from Charleston for Cozum; and the Lucy and Elizabeth, Starks, 6 days from Savannah for Liverpool. Dec. 4, the ship Margaret, Starbuck, 29 months from the Coast of Peru for N. Bedford, with a full cargo of sperm oil. Saw several ships and brigs standing for the Hook.
The ship Bellona, Hamilton, in 70 days from Naples. Nov. 21, in lat. 29, 15, fell in with the ship Illinois, Rogers. Capt. Hamilton begs leave to offer Captain R. his warmest acknowledgments of gratitude for having supplied him with several arti-

cles much wanted. Capt. H. left Palermo, Sept. 25, and passed Gibraltar Oct. 8. In the Gut, passed 9 ships of war, 3 of which were ships of the line.—Nov. 27, in lat. 34, 3, long. 68, 30, spoke the ship Acolus, Tredwell, 87 days from Tonnigen for Philadelphia.

The ship Governor Gilman, Brown, in 49 days from Amsterdam. The ship Mercury, Rogers, sailed 10 or 12 days before, and the ship Samuel Jackson, 12 days before, both for New York. Left, ship Richmond, of Philadelphia, ready for sea; ship Messenger, of Salem, do; ship Industry, Myers, of New York, for Baltimore; ship Perseverance, for New-York, in a few days; ship Montezuma, of Baltimore, ready for sea; ship Louisa, of do. just arrived and others. Sailed in company with the Governor Gilman, ship Savage, Delano, for N. Bedford. Spoke, Oct. 25, in lat. 49, long. 20, 51, the brig Maria and Jane, from Portsmouth for Amsterdam. Oct. 31, in lat. 43, 6, long. 37, 55, passed the ship Rising Sun, of Baltimore. Nov. 1, in lat. 42, 22, long. 53, 14, spoke the brig Olivia, from New York for Bilbao. 11th, in lat. 33, 50, long. 50, 18, the brig Washington, from Boston. 18th, in lat. 39, 48, long. 57, 30, the brig Jefferson, 56 days from Nantz, for Philadelphia. This most singular woman, who has changed the darkness of an Ethiopiate to the most delicate white, has always been habituated to the labor of the corn-field and other hard exercises: she has seldom experienced indisposition, and the remarkable change can only be ascribed to causes which the most learned and ingenious have never been able to ascertain. In Carey's American Museum may be found an elegant communication from the celebrated Doctor Rush, of Philadelphia, wherein that learned and scientific gentleman endeavors to account for the physical cause of such phenomena, is the only instance, except the present one, that ever occurred in the United States, which was that of a man in Virginia.
