We stop the press to say, that we have received the " JOURNAL DU COMMERCE," of the eighteenth of October, which contains a letter from the Emperor Napoleon to the Prefect and Mayor of Paris, under dates from the Imperial head quarters at Augsburg, of the 11th October stating, in substance, that a battle had taken piace at Wertingen, between several divisions of the French army, commanded by Prince Murat, and twelve battalions of Austrian grenadiers, the Elite of their army, in which the Austrians had been descated, with the loss of all their artillery, eight stand of colors, many officers and soldiers killed and wounded, and 4000 made personers.

Another letter of the same date, states that a second action had taken place within 24 hours, at Gunzbourg, in which the French were again successful.

In this action, the Austrians are stated to have lost 2500 men, killed and wounded, the signal favour bestowed by the Author 1200 prisoners, among them Maj. Gen. of All Good, on the citiz. ns of Charleston, French lost 400 killed and wounded.

Several Austrian Magazines, among them those of Fridberg, in Bavaria, had fallen into the hands of the French.

The communications of the Austrian troops are said to have been cut off at Augsbourg and Landsberg.
